Council Election

Voting information

AN ELECTION will be held for the position of Mayor of the City and in four Council Wards. The Council comprises the Mayor and ten Councillors (two for each of the five Wards).

No election is required for Fitzroy as both candidates were elected unopposed.

Elections will be held for the following positions:

- **Mayor**
Three candidates for one position
- **Nailsworth Ward**
Three candidates for two positions
- **Kingston Ward**
Four candidates for two positions
- **St Johns Wood Ward**
Three candidates for two positions
- **Highbury Ward**
Four candidates for two positions

Fitzroy Ward: both existing candidates for Fitzroy Ward were elected unopposed as there were only the two nominations received.

Candidates for all positions were given the opportunity to submit candidate profiles for inclusion in this edition of the Creative Community magazine to a maximum of 300 words. The information supplied by each candidate is published here for information and assistance.

Candidate profiles (150 words) will also be included with the postal ballot papers which will be posted out in the period 23-27 October 2006.

■ Postal voting

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT (ELECTIONS) ACT 1999 requires that Local Government Elections be conducted entirely by means of postal voting.

With respect to those Elected Member positions where an election is required, voting papers will be issued by post to all eligible voters in the period 23-27 October 2006.

Completed voting papers must reach the Returning Officer no later

than 5pm on Friday, 10 November 2006 when the election closes. Completed voting papers can also be placed in a ballot box at the Council Offices, 128 Prospect Road, Prospect.

The scrutiny and count will take place on Saturday 11 November 2006.

Postal voting papers will include candidate profiles and an explanatory notice detailing postal voting procedure. Voters are urged to read the explanatory notice thoroughly and carefully follow the procedure outlined to ensure that their vote is valid.

■ What if postal voting papers are not received?

ANY PERSON who does not receive postal voting papers by 1 November 2006 but believes that he or she is entitled to vote at the election may apply to the Electoral Officer Rod Smart on telephone 8269 5355.

■ Who can vote?

ALMOST EVERYONE! Residents over eighteen can vote in Council elections if they are on the State Electoral Roll or a ratepayer in respect of a place of residence within the area or ward.

Companies, joint property owners or occupiers and owners and occupiers of properties who do not live in the area are also entitled to vote, provided they appear on the voters roll as at 11 August 2006 when the roll closed.

Contact the Council to determine your entitlement.

■ Why vote?

VOTING IS IMPORTANT. You can influence Council and, after all, Council represents your interests.

The Council makes important decisions about the issues that affect your street, neighbourhood, and Council area.

These decisions affect your everyday life, so it's important that you have your say as to who becomes a Council member.

Only by voting for the candidates of your choice do you have a say.

Your vote will help decide which candidate is elected. This, in turn, will decide which policies Council pursues.

It is in your interest to vote.

■ Council's role

COUNCIL is a body corporate composed of elected members, headed by a Mayor.

It is responsible for "the management of affairs of the area and the exercise, performance and discharge" of the powers and duties conferred upon it by legislation.

■ Who makes up Council?

COUNCIL is divided into five areas called wards. Each ward is represented by two Councillors.

The Mayor is the 'first citizen' of the area and is elected by all voters to be the leader of the Council. The Mayor is the principal spokesperson for the Council and presides over Council meetings.

Councillors are elected by the voters within the ward. The term of office of elected members has recently been extended from three years to four years.

Elected members are not paid, however an allowance towards such costs as telephone, postage, childcare and travelling applies.

■ Council staff

THE COUNCIL employs staff to carry out those policies and decisions made by Council under the direction of the Chief Executive Officer.

Your vote will help decide which candidate is elected. This will decide which policies Council pursues. It is in your interest to have a say!

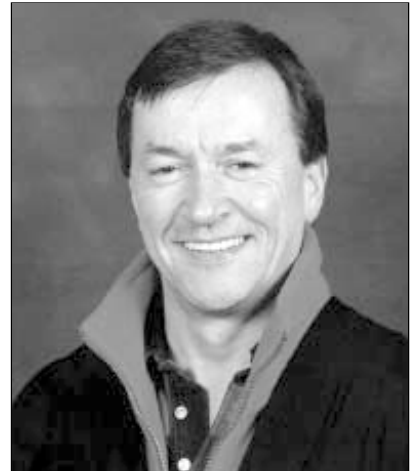

A PROSPECT RESIDENT for fifteen years, I was elected councillor in 2000 for Kingston Ward on a platform of revitalising the commercial prospects of the area. I was instrumental in convincing the owners of the Prospect Road/Flora Terrace site to build a café (now Caffé Cena) rather than utilise the site as a video outlet only per the original development application and this outcome has been cathartic in the rebirth of Prospect Road with the locating of a number of new businesses in the vicinity.

I was also instrumental in convincing the developer of the Prospect Road/Staples Court site (soon to be a major supermarket and shopping centre) to bring this application back to Council after it was initially refused by Council and personally and unashamedly fought this through to success. Once this site is up and running with a major supermarket chain and several name specialty shopping outlets it will attract other good players to the street and the residents of the City of Prospect will be the beneficiaries.

As residents are able to do more and more shopping and entertaining locally they significantly reduce vehicle and transport usage and consequently and proportionately reduce their contribution to greenhouse gas emissions.

Certainly those Councils that have done this well such as Burnside, Norwood Payneham & St Peters and Unley provide far greater residential amenity and pay significantly lower residential rates than Prospect. 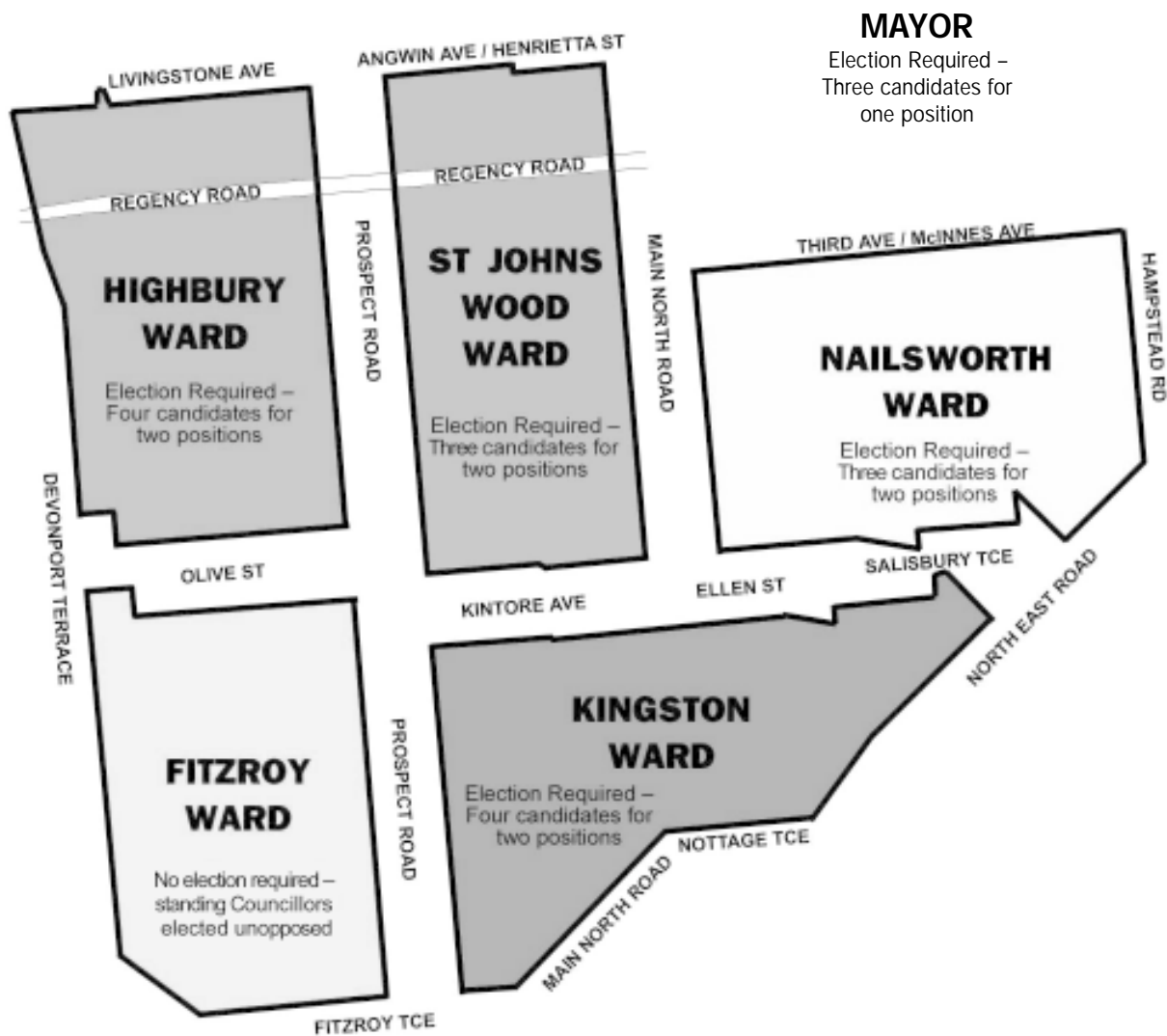
