

VALE ANN NEWMARCH OAM 9 June 1945 – 13 January 2022

Local resident and celebrated artist Ann Newmarch OAM passed away on Thursday 13 January 2022.

Ann Newmarch's art practice spanned a variety of mediums and styles from printmaking, painting, sculpture and installation, and her artworks were always underpinned by the belief that art is a form of activism.

Instrumental in a number of groups, including the Women's Art Movement and the Progressive Arts Movement, Ann was a pivotal figure in the protest arts movement that emerged in Adelaide in the 1970s. Her activism was also directed toward workers' rights, attitudes towards women, community, and the environment.

A pioneer of the Community Arts Movement, Ann initiated the practice of Stobie pole painting in Prospect and the Prospect Mural Group and Community Association of Prospect Poster Collective. She instructed community members in the art of screenprint for the purpose of creating posters for local events and issues, many of which are now reproduced on the walls of the Prospect Library. The Prospect Mural Group was active until 1983 and many of their works survive around Prospect.

A long-term lecturer at the South Australian School of Art, and a recipient of an Order of Australia Medal for her contribution to art and the community, Ann was also the first living female artist to have had a retrospective exhibition at the Art Gallery of South Australia, and the first Artist in Residence with a local Council.

Ann's artist residency at Prospect spawned the Community Art Show, the popularity of which necessitated a permanent home for the event and garnered momentum for the establishment of the Prospect Gallery, renamed Newmarch Gallery in her honour in 2019.

Ann's art was always political. Her distinctly feminist perspective was grounded in her personal experiences and community life, saying: 'Art should be made out of personal experience and not out of art concerns. Personal experience is only a useful source of art when it is accompanied by an understanding of the social conditions in which it arises.'

We are very grateful for Ann's support of the Prospect community where she was a long-time resident.

OPEN SPACE UPGRADE PROJECTS

Our Open Space Strategy outlines our direction for improving our Parks and Reserves, implementing innovative techniques including sustainable practices to create and deliver broadened opportunities for open space. These are some of the spaces that we are currently working on.

Irish Harp Reserve

Irish Harp Reserve (350 Regency Road, Prospect) is scheduled for an upgrade from mid-2022. In late 2021, Council was successful in receiving grant funding to support the upgrade of this reserve from the State Government's Open Space Grant Program. We are pleased to receive the funding which will go a long way in providing suitable and flexible facilities in Irish Harp Reserve, including pathways linking the three



park entries with improved accessible entry points, safety lighting, improved lawn and irrigation for the oval area, new backstop netting, family gathering space with shade, and new play equipment and nature play suitable for all ages.

Percy Street Reserve

Percy Street Reserve (65 Percy Street, Prospect), a small pocket park, is frequented by locals, particularly those with dogs and small children. The park is scheduled to be upgraded in the 2022/23 financial year and the design will include enhancement of the existing facilities to cater for more of our local community.

Peppermint Gums Reserve

Peppermint Gums Reserve (corner Dean St and Barker Rd, Prospect) is classified as

a neighbourhood park in our Open Space Strategy which means that it is aimed for purposeful visitation (longer stays) with flexible spaces, gathering areas, play area with both junior and senior play elements and irrigated garden beds/lawn. We are working through the design of the upgrade which will be ready for construction in the 2022/23 financial year. We have already received lots of positive and useful feedback through our previous consultations on this project.

New community and sports hub for Broadview

A key component of the Broadview Oval/ Yarnta Tutu yarta Master Plan is the new Broadview Oval Community and Sports Hub. The building will be a contemporary and longlasting community asset, designed to maximise accessibility and use by all members of our community and beyond. It will connect to the surrounding public open space and amenity, creating an active and integrated community destination, promoting better health and wellbeing for all who visit. Construction is scheduled to start in the next financial year. The new facility will be located on the centre wing position of Broadview Oval and will

replace the existing Broadview Football Clubrooms.

Key features include:

- Change rooms (male and female)
- Clubrooms
- Function and meeting rooms
- Storage facilities
- Spectator viewing areas

A total of \$4M funding is now available to commence work on this new facility, thanks to a State Government grant of \$1.5M, and \$2.5M from Council. A Community Reference Group consisting of community representatives and stakeholders has been established to provide information, advice and feedback to the Project Control Group and Elected Members regarding the development and implementation of the Project.

Beyond school activities, Inika is involved in the Youth Environment Council of South Australia, and is also involved as a volunteer in a Foster Care program with Anglicare. As a student at Blackfriars Priory School, Lewis has performed an outstanding role as Head Prefect. Annual Grants Program 2022/2023

Prospect's coworking community is flourishing with Little City Coworking growing into a brand new building. Little City will open their new custom-built coworking space in autumn of 2022 in the recently built 132 Prospect Road development, central to Prospect Road's Village Heart retail precinct. The new space doubles their footprint, allowing additional businesses and members to benefit from the community and facilities Little City provides.

The addition of new coworking capacity is welcome news for our local economy, as Prospect's coworking spaces have proven to be great incubators for new and growing local businesses. Spaces like Little City's provide a less isolated work environment for small businesses, home-based, remote or freelance work. Coworking also encourages growth through collaboration, connections and knowledge sharing with other motivated professionals.

Little City's previous home at 118 Prospect Road was home to 21 different businesses and over 40 members by the end of 2021. The new location will provide an additional 20 workspaces to attract new businesses and remote workers to the coworking community.

"Little City's new premises has been purposebuilt to provide our citizens (members) with all the facilities they need from a modern workspace, like our fantastic new alfresco balcony, abundance of natural light, multiple meeting rooms, private conversation areas, end of trip facilities and most importantly social areas," said Little City's Managing Director Shaun Lyon.

"From opening seven years ago, we have learned what our citizens need and want to truly enjoy the place they choose to work. It goes well beyond the basics of a desk or office. Everything we have learned has been tediously incorporated into the design of the new space and how it will operate. The feedback from our citizens has been incredibly positive, the new space will allow many of them to keep on growing. We're grateful for the higher than anticipated demand the new offices and desks are receiving, they are filling fast and it's exciting to bring new people into our community."

She encouraged locals everywhere to get involved, to paint, to sculpt clay tiles, to create posters and to exhibit. She was our first "artist in residence" and advocated for the creation of the State's first "Community Gallery"- our gallery!

Her mark on our community and its spirit of encouragement is profound. We are so blessed to have enjoyed her inspiration and company for so long. Vale Ann Newmarch, your legend lives on.

TACKLING CLIMATE CHANGE AT A LOCAL LEVEL

We have taken a pledge to tackle climate change in our own backyard and joined The Climate Council Cities Power Partnership, partnering with over 145 Australian councils to cut greenhouse gas pollution, switch to clean energy and build resilient communities.

"Our community has long supported environmental initiatives such as recycling water, generating energy from the sun, recycling food waste, minimising single use plastics and maximising procurement of goods made from recycled materials," said Mayor David O'Loughlin.

"It's now time to step up and play an even greater role in encouraging our community to mitigate climate change through their decisions and actions. Our membership will enable Council to lead the way, by demonstrating best practice, and providing education and



resources to support our community. Working together, both across the Cities Power Partnership network of Councils, and alongside our community will maximise our collective impact on the vital mitigation task."

Member councils have six months from their joining date to pledge five ways in which they will reduce carbon emissions across their operations. City of Prospect staff are currently reviewing evidence-based options, and will make an announcement in May.

We're excited to be part of the growing national network of councils responding to climate change at a local level



The term "University" is used in the sense of an association or community of teachers and learners united in the pursuit of knowledge. U3A tutors donate their knowledge, skills and time to share with others. The syllabus is very broad - you can learn a new language, explore the history of other countries or civilisations, listen to speakers on a wide range of subjects, unleash your inner creativity with creative writing or art, participate in a book reading group or film club, or undertake some gentle exercise through Circle dancing or joining a walking group. 
