
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WELCOME TO SPRING

This edition of Prospect Magazine illuminates the wonderful selection of food available right across our neighbourhood. Spring marks the end of dark winter days and the start of new beginnings as the climate becomes warmer and plants begin to bloom. It's also a great time of transformation as we see the benefits brought about by change and the nurturing of new growth.

SPRING LAMB SALAD BY ROSA MATTO

Rosa's spring lamb recipe is the perfect way to usher in the new season. Spring lamb is very tender and has a deliciously mild flavour. Look for firm, slightly pink meat with a velvety texture.



PEA AND GARLIC SALSA

- 1 cup peas, cooked and drained
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 6 mint leaves, shredded

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Blanch podded broad beans in boiling salted water until tender, drain and refresh. Peel. Blanch flat green beans in boiling salted water until tender, drain and refresh. Add to broad beans.

SERVES 8

INGREDIENTS

- 250g broad beans (podded weight 400g total)
- 250g flat green beans, trimmed
- 16 spears asparagus, trimmed
- 2 oranges zested and juiced
- 2 oranges peeled and segmented
- 6 tbsp olive oil
- 2 small red chillies, seeded and finely sliced
- 1 tsp grainy mustard
- Small pinch of sugar to taste
- Salt and pepper
- 300g lamb tenderloin, trimmed of sinew
- 6 small slices pancetta, crisped in the oven
- Small bunch chives, cut into 3cm lengths
- 1 tbsp olive oil, extra
- 2 red onions, finely sliced
- 1 tbsp basil, cut into strips
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Olive oil as needed

THE SPRING GARDEN

Spring is the perfect time to plant, experiment and entertain with fresh food and ingredients. Some flowers that flourish over the spring season can be visually attractive as well as mouth-wateringly tasty, but proper identification of flower species is essential to avoid poisoning!

Check with your local nursery or online plant guides to find out what is edible before eating, and remove pistils and stamens if required. Most importantly, only consume flowers that are grown within your own home; don't take risks on park or roadside blooms, and only eat those grown without the use of pesticides.

VEGGIES TO PLANT NOW:



Tomato Celery

Sweet Corn Zucchini

TURNING FLOWER INTO FLAVOUR:

Chive Blossoms (*Allium schoenoprasum*) **and Roast Potato.** Pull apart the flower blossoms, which should break apart easily, to give a light onion flavour and aroma. Add the chive blossoms, celery and sour cream to put a new twist on the classic roast potato dish.



Nasturtium (*Tropaeolum majus*) **Salad** Nasturtium leaves and flowers are both edible. Mixed with your preferred garden greens or veggies, the leaves will give a hot peppery taste, or use the flowers for a slight mustardy sweetness.



Lavender (Lavandula angustifolia) Meringues

a very hot grill pan. Remove from heat and

- 2. Blanch asparagus in boiling salted water until just tender (about 1–2 minutes), drain and refresh. Add to broad beans and flat beans, along with orange segments.
- 3. To make dressing, whisk together olive oil, orange juice and zest, chillies, mustard and sugar. Season with salt and pepper.
- 4. Rub lamb tenderloin with oil and season with salt and pepper. Grill to your liking on

- allow to rest for 10 minutes before slicing across the diagonal.
- 5. Place broad beans, green beans, orange segments and lamb (with any juices from the resting period) into a serving bowl.
- 6. Add sliced onion and basil and toss very gently together with the dressing to coat all ingredients.
- 7. Combine all salsa ingredients with a potato masher to achieve a chunky texture.
- 8. To serve: Top salad with a spoonful of pea salsa, then crumble pancetta and scatter with chives

Lavender gives off a sweet, floral flavour, with hints of lemon and citrus. To end the evening on a high note, add some purple food colouring and lavender to a standard meringue recipe for a crowd pleasing dessert.

It's been 12 months since we installed Mark Warren's beautiful and whimsical animal drawings in the light boxes at the rear of the Council Civic Centre. Illuminated at night, the ten light boxes provide ambient lighting, as well as a surprising visual delight, for evening visitors.

With Mark's exhibition having been well received and appreciated by the thousands of visitors to the Civic Centre over the past 12 months, it was timely to hand over the much sought after space to longtime resident and local artist Cathy Brooks.

Cathy's work is collectively called Imaginarium and depicts the room as a physical and metaphorical

space. First exhibited at Prospect Gallery in 2008, her images explore what lies beyond the room, enquiring as to whether it is decorative or functional, a constructed or imagined space. The work focuses on the room interior as both a physical and metaphorical space, which can be seen as an extension of the self.

The light box panels are reproductions of her images, inspired by her experiences in Europe and Africa, which were originally painted onto wallpaper that is often exotic and sometimes commonplace. You are invited to experience the enchantment of Cathy's work, reimagined at the Lightbox Gallery.





HOME **COMPOSTING TIPS**



Time or money invested in your garden's soil always brings the best returns in healthy, vigorous plants and great harvests. Here are some helpful tips to make sure you are getting the most out of your home compost system.

- The microbes responsible for breaking down your compost pile need a balanced diet of nitrogen and carbon. Nitrogen comes from green materials such as food scraps, manure, and grass clippings. Carbon comes from brown materials such as dead leaves, hay, wood chips and shredded newspaper. A ratio that contains equal portions by weight (not volume) of both works best. Newspaper, or plain white computer paper, is excellent for composting, but should be shredded first to speed up the process.
- Plants that have been treated with pesticides and/or herbicides (including weeds and lawn clippings) should not be added to your compost.
- For faster composting, keep your pile or compost bin in direct sun.
- Compost piles should remain damp but not too wet. As you build your compost pile, make sure that each layer is moistened as it's added. The surface should also remain damp, especially during the summer months.

Does your compost pile smell? It's probably due to a large number of anaerobic microbes, which are working hard to break down your compost. but creating a smelly situation in the process. To cut down on the anaerobic process, aerate your pile regularly, creating air spaces and limiting the anaerobic microbes while stimulating the less stinky aerobic microbes.

When finished, your compost should look, feel and smell like rich, dark soil. You should not be able to recognise any of the items you put in there.



KITCHEN ORGANICS BASKET



City of Prospect provides every household with a kitchen organics basket to assist with diverting food waste away from landfill. Food waste and other organic material can make up around half of what is placed in the waste (red lid) bins. Using your kitchen organics basket diverts thousands of tonnes of compostable material from landfill every year and reduces greenhouse gas emissions associated with this waste stream.

Organic waste is a valuable resource that Council collects in its green lid bins for processing into nutrient-rich compost - so even if you don't have the time or space for your own compost heap, you can still do your bit to reduce waste to landfill! Best of all, the material collected can include things that you wouldn't put on your own compost heap, such as meat, bones and shells.

Any food or organic material can be placed in the kitchen organics basket, including:

- Cake, bread scraps
- Fruit, vegetables
- Tea bags, coffee grounds
- Meat scraps, bones, seafood (cooked, raw)
- Egg shells, oyster shells
- · Dairy products e.g. cheese, yoghurt
- Shredded paper
- Tissues, paper towels
- Hair

What can't be put in the kitchen organics basket?

- Plastic bags
- Cling wrap
- Dishcloths, sponges

such as food scraps, manure, and grass clippings.



- Nappies
- Cigarette butts or ash
- Vacuum dust
- Medical waste
- Kitty litter
- · Cans, metals
- Glass, ceramics
- Liquids

SPRING CHICKENS!





Keeping chooks is fun and they're a great source of fresh eggs, free fertiliser and can even help control pests and insects in your garden.

If you want to keep your birds healthy and your neighbours happy, follow these simple pieces of advice:

- Minimise noise and odour choose a suitable location for your chicken coop so it won't affect your neighbours with noise or odour. As a guide, set it back at least a metre from any property boundary, and at least 10 –15 metres away from dwellings, shops or other public places.
- **Keep it clean** Make sure your shelter is made of sound materials so that it's weather and vermin proof, has sufficient ventilation, and is

kept clean. To control flies, place fly baits and fly paper inside the shelter out of reach of the chooks.

- Avoid overcrowding and dispose of waste appropriately - Each bird should have at least 0.4m² of floor space and droppings need to be cleaned out regularly. Poultry manure is great for compositing or when used as a soil conditioner.
- Say NO to roosters to prevent noise problems within the neighbourhood.

There are also plenty of websites dedicated to keeping chooks, building great chicken coops and making your own compost from the manure. Get it right and you'll be enjoying fresh eggs for brekkie in no time!




WORM FARMS

Approximately 30% of all domestic waste is food material, and 25% of domestic waste is garden material. When this organic material is buried in landfill, it breaks down in an anaerobic environment (without oxygen) producing harmful greenhouse gases, particularly methane. Worm farms and compost bins are available for purchase at a discounted rate (30 below RRP) from the Council Civic Centre (worm farms are \$54.50 and compost bins are \$36.10). Alternatively, if you have purchased your own elsewhere you can apply for a rebate from Council. The rebate is \$20 per Worm Farm or Compost Bin, whilst a \$10 rebate is available for a compost stirrer.

Home composting and worm farming are excellent ways to reduce the amount of organic waste sent to landfill, while at the same time turning this valuable organic material into nutrient-rich soil and liquid fertilisers. When these fertilisers are applied to our gardens it helps to improve the soil condition, leading to healthier plants while increasing the soil's water-holding capacity.

A QUIET ACHIEVER'S REMARKABLE EXPERIENCE




The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month has a special significance, representing the moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front in 1918. Armistice Day, as it was known, became Remembrance Day following the Second World War, in commemoration of all those who died in war.

We also remember those who fought in the wars. One of these people, Pat Rothery (now 96), lives in Prospect. Pat spent many years in the British Navy during the Second World War, escorting merchant ships taking war supplies from the UK to North Russian ports to replace vital items destroyed by a German onslaught.

In vicious seas whilst on the destroyer HMS Impulsive, Pat recalls he was directed to secure a depth charge which had become loose on the deck. He was washed overboard in his attempt, but thankfully another wave washed him back on deck like a rag doll. His injuries were repairable and he lives to tell the story, one of many from his time in India, Woomera, and working at NASA tracking stations.

Pat's service has been recognised with the rare Russian Ushakov medal for bravery and the British Arctic Star medal. Through his membership of Prospect Men's Probus Club, Pat continues to give to his community with Club Secretary John Lumsden referring to Pat as a quite achiever and a valued club member.

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A CLOSE SHAVE WITH JAM MIX GIG

Sue Williams is a volunteer and participant in Jam Mix Gig, better known as JMG. JMG is a music and mental health community band, using a shared passion for music to play their way to recovery from mental health issues.

"JMG are raising funds for their next project, either recording a CD or a live recording performance. Their goal is to raise \$6,000 by December, when I will be shaving off my hair at our end-of-year gig," said Sue.

Figures published by SANE Australia suggest that approximately 20% of Australian adults are affected by some form of mental illness every year. Of these, anxiety disorders affect around 14% of the adult population and depression affects around 6%. Some are also affected by substance abuse disorders, psychotic illnesses such as schizophrenia, personality disorders and other conditions. Many people have more than one diagnosis.

Nearly half (45%) of the population will experience a mental disorder at some stage in their lives, while at least one third of young people have had an episode of mental illness by the time they are 25 years old. Most people with mental illness recover well and are able to lead fulfilling lives in the community – when they receive appropriate ongoing treatment and support.



BRINGING BACK THE TRAMS

Have you ever been stranded waiting for a train that never arrives, or a bus that's been delayed? While public transport is a State government responsibility, it has a very local and personal impact.

Mayor David O'Loughlin has joined other inner-metropolitan mayors and CEOs in establishing a new advocacy group, working together across local government to support improvements to public transport options. The group's immediate focus is on the proposed AdeLINK tram network, which has the potential to extend the existing tramline out to City of Prospect and other Council areas.

The State government has committed to undertaking a feasibility study to work out where and how the tram network should be expanded, as part of an over-arching plan of improvements to the public transport network. What We Heard

Council recently undertook a series of activities to seek feedback on the future relocation of the much-loved Thomas Street Centre. Libraries have changed significantly in recent years, so the consultation activities were aimed at determining what the community wanted to see included in the new facility.



With more than 500 responses received, the overall feeling expressed was that a facility is essential for the city, with the most desired services including the library collection (hard copy, online and digital), Justice of the Peace services, public Wi–Fi, innovative technology and art activities or displays. Other desired services identified by respondents were a café, a children's play area and children's events, public meeting rooms, outdoor space and services for those with special needs. The

survey outcomes showed that the desired 'feel' of a Library and Innovation Centre was that it be light and open, safe, flexible and inspiring, with a modern, artistic and sustainable external form.

Council has assessed a number of sites for their suitability as a new location and decided to undertake design and feasibility studies on the Council Tram Barn site on Main North Road (located at the corner of Johns Road) and the Civic Centre site at 128 Prospect Road. Additional community consultation will be undertaken before a decision is made on the preferred future location of the centre, so keep your eyes peeled for opportunities to be a part of this discussion.





Anne Bradstreet once said, "If we had no winter the spring would not be so pleasant". I'm always thankful when spring rolls around. It's a sign that the cold of winter is soon at an end with gardens starting to come alive and days becoming a little longer.

In recent months, council has been hard at work debating two main issues. The first is the budget which was approved by the majority of council in mid-July. No one likes rate increases, but we have constrained the rate increase to 3.6% - the lowest increase for 13 years (it equates to an extra 94 cents a week). The rate would have been slightly less, but we were required to adjust the budget at the last minute to pay for the state government's hard waste levy.

We're not just calling it a library, because it's so much more than that.

There are many interesting projects in our budget this year, including further undergrounding of power lines along Prospect Road, support for community events including Tourrific Prospect and a Diwali festival, the pigeon eradication program, upgrades of footpaths, parks and gardens, along with a program to help households become more environmentally friendly. I was also pleased that council supported a cloth nappy trial for parents to provide an alternative to disposable nappies. The budget shows that Prospect Council is far more than simply roads, rates and rubbish and provides you with a number of real improvements to your local community.

As you'd be aware, we need to move out of the much-loved Thomas Street Centre by late 2019. We have toured similar centres in other Councils to determine what will work best for us in a new facility. It has become obvious in recent months that our current site is too small and inflexible when compared to others with more meeting rooms, work rooms, history collections, integrated outdoor spaces, 3D printers, and even recording studios for podcasts and music.

We want to create a welcoming place for you to access knowledge, experience collaborative learning, training, courses, art, and technology, and for it to be the centre of an active, innovative and vibrant community - where you can meet, organise,

We are pleased to have the support of Minister for Planning, John Rau, to review and improve standards as we go forward. Your comments on this are very welcome and help us continue to be a leader, not just in the amount of main road development, but also in quality and performance.

Both locations have benefits and drawbacks, and no doubt this will be the biggest and most significant decision for council in some time.



- R.M. Williams Shop and Museum (5 Percy • Street) - where Reginald Murray Williams first set up shop in 1934
- Butterfly Gates (59 Johns Road) made by blacksmith and former professional fighter, Albert Burdon.
- Glasshouse Projects House (Muriel Street) an interesting take on old meets new.
- "Air Raid" Shelter (Wilcox Avenue) served as a communications bunker during World War 2
- Windmill Hotel (Main North Road) first licensed in 1843
- Mud Brick House (Marian Place) constructed in the early 1980s by members of the Village Community Co-operative
- 1880s and 1890s Villas (Clifton Street) many of the houses were built by James Trevail.

URBAN RENEWAL



30 YEARS DANCING AND STILL GOING STRONG







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FENWICKS REAL ESTATE PROPERTY REPORT



Peter Fenwick, Director of Fenwicks Real Estate, provides his half-yearly update on real estate movements in City of Prospect.

The number of residential properties offered for sale in the suburb Prospect fell by 30% in the first half of 2016 compared to 2015. Whilst not great for real estate agents, this has generated very strong competition as buyers compete for the fewer residences

on offer, with our experience being that sale price expectations have regularly been exceeded.

In the same period Fitzroy experienced a surge in residential sales, with 11 sales recorded in the first 6 months including 8 at or above \$1 million, compared to 8 sales for the full 2015 year. Elsewhere, the number of sales was roughly on par with those in the same period last year.

The median price of residential property increased for all suburbs in City of Prospect except Broadview and Ovingham. A total of 16 residences sold for more than \$1 million in the first half of 2016, compared with a total of 17 for the whole of 2015.

HERITAGE GRANTS NOW OPEN

Council's Heritage Grants Program has gone from strength to strength, providing financial support for eligible owners of Local Heritage Places or properties within the Historic Conservation Zone who want to undertake works to retain or restore the heritage value of their property. With the program fully subscribed in 2015/16, you'd better get in quick to take advantage of the offer in the new financial year. Work that is eligible for grant funding includes restoration, conservation or reinstatement of the original heritage features of these places. Council will refund 50% of the cost of the conservation work up to a maximum of \$2,000 per property. There is no minimum value of works required to be eligible.

Priority is given to recently designated heritage places, buildings that make a prominent contribution to the streetscape, buildings that have not previously received grant funding and projects that support the building's significant heritage elements.
