EASY TOMATO & VEGETABLE SOUP

- 400g can of beans (red kidney, borlotti, or mixed), if desired
- 400g tinned tomatoes, diced
- 1 jar pasta sauce
- Handful chopped fresh herbs (basil, parsley, thyme work well), if desired

INSTRUCTIONS

- Dice vegetables into even sizes, approx.
 1cm cubes. Add to large soup pot with 1 litre of stock and bring to the boil.
- 2. Add beans, tomatoes and pasta sauce and stir. Bring back to the boil, then simmer until vegetables are tender.
- 3. Sprinkle fresh herbs and stir through

TREES TO PLANT IN YOUR GARDEN:



Crepe Myrtle – *Lagerstroemia indica* – A deciduous tree growing up to 8m, it has stunning flowers and can be heavily pruned to a smaller tree size of about 4m, making it suitable for small gardens.



Bella-donna - *Brachychiton acerifolius x* populneus - A medium-sized native tree that can grow in a variety of soils and produces large, bright pink flowers.



Jacaranda - *Jacaranda mimosifolia* - A stunning spectacle of purple when flowering, this deciduous tree is great for larger north–facing gardens, allowing warm winter sun to penetrate through to your home.

proposals are also welcome from experienced or emerging artists, and local artists are particularly encouraged to apply.



NEW HOMES FOR OUR FEATHERED FRIENDS

As part of Council's ongoing commitment to biodiversity, Council has installed bird boxes in streets where White Cedar Trees have been removed as part of Council's White Cedar Removal program. The bird boxes provide an opportunity for shelter for those species of birds, such as Rosellas and Lorikeets, that would naturally nest in hollows previously provided by the White Cedars. Installing bird boxes provides these cavity—nesting birds with a safe place in which to raise their young and maintain the biodiversity of the area

REDUCING WASTE WITH KESAB

As part of Council's commitment to ongoing education around its Waste Management System, Council will be working with KESAB to deliver a face-to-face "doorstepping" campaign. Unit blocks from the suburbs of Prospect, Nailsworth and Collinswood, which together comprise a total of 50 residences, have been selected for assessment and education.

The education program promotes the hard waste collection service (to deter illegal dumping), provides information on the process of recycling and organics (to reduce contamination rates in recycling and green organics bins) and seeks feedback on why some residents do not participate in recycling.

KESAB will also be delivering education sessions to schools and kindergartens across City of Prospect, which will include having a qualified waste auditor assess the bins and waste contract of the schools, with recommendations provided to support any necessary changes. Students at the schools will enjoy recycled papermaking workshops, where they have the opportunity to create different types of recycled paper products. In addition, worm farm and composting workshops will provide students with practical understanding of composting and worm farm systems, and the importance of diverting food from landfill.



DIY ADVICE FOR YOUR AUTUMN GARDEN









AUTUMN'S AGENDA

With the heat of summer still fresh in our memories, the cooler days of autumn are here to provide some relief and remind us that it's the perfect time to spruce up the garden. It's no secret that the success of your garden in spring and summer depends on how much effort you put in during the cooler months. Maintenance activities such as planting and pruning are particularly important, but take the opportunity to pamper your garden with some revitalising treatments for the best results.

PAMPERING YOUR GARDEN

Properly preparing the soil is essential to establishing the best foundation for gardening success. A cost-effective way to improve your soil is as simple as introducing compost. Compost can be made easily using veggie leftovers, fallen leaves and grass clippings, and will provide the soil with muchneeded nutrients; your plants will love you for it!

You can also use farm yard manure, or organic—based fertilisers such as blood and bone, to add nitrogen and phosphorous to the soil. Keep in mind that the variety in plant species and soil conditions will affect the type (and amount) of fertiliser required to make your plants thrive.

ESTABLISHING NEW PLANTS

There are few things more rewarding than watching your garden grow successfully, and establishing new plants is often the most exciting step in transforming the look, smell and feel of your garden. With summer ending and the soil still warm, now is the perfect time to plant your evergreens. Position them in an area of the garden where they will continue to catch the sun as the shadows grow longer (and the days cooler) in the coming months.

After preparing your soil and planting your plants, lay a thick layer about 7–10cm of mulch throughout the entire garden. Mulching the garden helps keep moisture in the soil and minimises weed growth. This will also help keep the fertiliser in the garden if there is heavy rainfall, and can help minimise odours. You may find that mulching the garden beforehand and planting through the mulch may be easier if you have a lot of new plants.

For a low-maintenance garden, choose plants that come from areas of similar rainfall to where you live. Generally all plants need extra care when being established so make sure you look after your new garden, particularly in the first 8–13 weeks. Trees will need extra care over a longer

period to establish well. Remember that water is absorbed by the roots of the plant, not the leaves, so water the soil surrounding each plant well. The best times to water are during the early morning or in the evening.

PRUNING EXISTING PLANTS

Most plants have specific pruning needs that should be assessed based on individual characteristics and placement within the garden. Removing lower branches and properly thinning out the canopy of backyard trees will assist in allowing additional light to your understorey planting. Seeking some independent advice from a qualified arborist may be appropriate for your larger trees, to ensure that they remain healthy and structurally sound.

Many shrubs should be pruned back to keep your garden looking neat and tidy. The amount of pruning and maintenance depends on the type of plant so keep that in mind when choosing plants for your garden. Some plants, like many Australian natives, need a bit of a prune but it is easy to do. Pruning up to a third of the growth after flowering will keep your natives looking dense, formed and attractive.

Remove any dead plants in your garden as they can spread disease and infection.

TAKING CARE OF YOUR LAWN

Taking care of your lawn can be quite different to how you look after your plants in the garden. Follow these simple maintenance tips to keep it healthy and green.

Mowing: cut your lawn according to the type of grass you have. Some types of grass prefer being cut at a higher height as they are less exposed to water evaporation. This can also help prevent weed growth.

Aeration: aerating the lawn during the growing season helps get oxygen, water and nutrients to the root system. There are spike aerators which poke holes in the lawn, but more effectively is the plug aerator which is a machine that removes small plugs of soil from the lawn. Fertiliser and wetting agents can be applied after aeration, and you can fill the aeration holes with sand if you don't want a lawn full of holes.

Feeding: even if you don't aerate your lawn, applying fertiliser evenly across your lawn will help keep it looking healthy.

Watering: water your lawn regularly when there hasn't been any rain, either early morning or in the evening.

Sunlight: try to keep your lawn warm during the cooler months. Trimming back tree branches around the lawn can allow sunlight to penetrate, while any fallen leaves should be raked up.

Keeping your garden looking healthy and growing well suits all skill levels and ages, with the added benefit that learning about gardening can encourage a greater care for the wider natural environment. Call in to Council's Library to explore a range of gardening books and magazines; you (and your garden) will be glad you did!

forget. "That was the biggest honour I have had bestowed upon me," said Chris, reflecting on the incredible moment.


When asked what it was she enjoyed about volunteering, Chris didn't hesitate and got straight to the point, saying "If people feel good because I've done something for them, then I feel good."

PROSPECT POWERS AHEAD

The number of business start-ups in Prospect has been increasing since 2013. Previously business start-ups and business exits were broadly equivalent. However, in mid-2013 start-up businesses began to exceed exits resulting in approximately 50 new businesses in the 2013/14 financial year. The majority of other Council areas in SA were only growing slowly or flat-lining, while Prospect's growth in new businesses was 2.4% in that financial year.

The actual reason for the increase is most likely linked to Council securing the nbn^{TM} , which (while not fully rolled out until 2016) was widely publicised in 2013. Many businesses have said that they moved to Prospect to take advantage of the nbn^{TM} roll out.

This data is available from the Australian Business Register and is only released intermittently. City of Prospect will continue to receive this information directly and regularly measure new start-ups.

A Report by University of SA (2016) on Usage of the nbn™ in Prospect found that 60% of businesses surveyed wanted faster broadband speed, while over 80% of businesses surveyed said that broadband has increased their sales and revenue. The increase in revenue and the growth in new businesses is the ultimate proof of the benefit of the Digital Drive of Council.



SITE SELECTED FOR COMMUNITY HUB, LIBRARY AND INNOVATION CENTRE

City of Prospect took a significant step towards developing its new Community Hub, Library and Innovation Centre (CLIC) at its January Council meeting, deciding that this exciting development will be at located at its current Civic facility at 128 Prospect Road, Prospect.

The development of the new CLIC includes co-location of the civic facilities and Council administration; a mixed use facility with a development partner; relocation of the depot functions; and sale of the Council-owned Depot site at 82–90 Johns Road as well as its land holding at 218 Main North Road, Prospect.

There was considerable debate about the merits of the site, and whether the Depot and adjoining land should be sold to a developer and what this meant for the heritage listed Tram Barn. The Tram Barn is a State Heritage listed building currently used as a storage facility for Council operations, but reflects the history of public transport in Prospect. Council has called for a report from staff on whether ownership of the Tram Barn portion of the Depot site could be retained by Council without impacting on the financial sustainability of the project.

A number of factors were taken into account in reaching this decision, including location, centrality, heritage, safe access, parking, proximity to complimentary land uses, cost, cost efficiencies over time, benefit to the community, projected visitation numbers, population density, growth in population, and other issues. Further, the development offers the opportunity to

consolidate Council services which will provide efficiency savings to its operational costs.

It is an important decision for Council, which is being forced to relocate its library, digital hub and gallery services to a new site by mid–2019. The Department for Education and Child Development (DECD) will re–acquire the site at the conclusion of the current lease, following many years of Council servicing the community from the Thomas Street Centre.



BOLD PLANS FOR OUR FUTURE

The changing face of Churchill and Prospect Roads is becoming increasingly evident.

While we have copped a lot of criticism, I thought it necessary to remind ourselves why the Council took such a bold step to go down the path of medium density development on the transit corridors of our city.

Prospect is over—reliant on residential rates. We don't have a lot of scope for commercial and industrial development so we cannot benefit from these sectors in revenue raising as other Councils do. We had to look for ways to reduce the burden on our residential ratepayers and the businesses that support them. Increasing housing density in specific areas of the city provided us with that opportunity.

Our community tells us that they love Prospect for its community feel, leafy streets and character housing stock. There was, and still is, a great deal of dissatisfaction whenever a house was demolished and something that would be better suited to a new housing estate went up or there was a subdivision that crammed in as many buildings at it could at the expense of private open space. Our side streets were changing to the detriment of the character and historic importance of our city.

Around 2010, the State Government released its 30-year plan for Greater Adelaide. Here was an opportunity to deal with the upwards pressure on rates and to take control of development on our side streets. By agreeing to increases of height and density on our main transit corridors, we were able to better protect our side streets with 11 new character zones and increased scope of our Historic Conservation Zone. This does not mean it's impossible for a house to be demolished. What it does mean is that what replaces it must be within the character of the street. And more importantly for residents, it makes it more difficult to subdivide in more of our streets.

In better protecting our character and easing the rate burden we had to make some tough decisions. While the development on Churchill and Prospects Road may not be popular with everyone, it was a necessary means to an end.

KEEPING OUR INVISIBLE SERVICES INVISIBLE

Council services should generally be visible. We want to see where our rate money goes and enjoy the services that it provides. Better roads and footpaths, parks and gardens, libraries, community events, rubbish collection and the like.

During our recently completed strategic plan, some of the feedback we received mocked our target to create 'visible and appreciated services' as being too obvious.

Stormwater management bucks this trend though. A properly functioning stormwater management system should be invisible. We have a problem when stormwater, flooding and its impacts become visible.

Recent weather events have had their impact on our community over the past few months. In particular the western parts of Prospect where terrain is low around Alexandra Street and Stan Watson Reserve are two of what would be a number of locations where stormwater incidents have been reported, and residents in our community adversely affected.

Parts of our stormwater infrastructure are over 90 years old and were designed with different technologies and loads in mind. New carports, sheds, pergolas, dwellings and landscaped areas increase stormwater run-off that needs to be processed and cleared with existing infrastructure.

The regional impact of stormwater management is also an important consideration as we need capacity down-stream (crossing other council areas) during times of peak flow in order to ensure the stormwater collected in our community can flow, ultimately out to the Port and sea or to more environmentally sustainable alternatives.

The importance of a robust stormwater management system, while invisible, cannot be understated. Council is in the process of reviewing a number of opportunities to improve our stormwater system, its strength and resilience to cater for increased and changing demand.

CHERISHED MEMORIES OF THE CITY

Some interesting items about Prospect Council area I've collated as a Prospect Local History Group member:

- Prospect Road (Eliza Street), first a lane from Highbury Street to Marian Place, was opened up as a road to Fitzroy Terrace from Highbury Street in 1858.
- Blackfriars College, when owned by the Johnson family, had a wire-netted enclosure for emus, which were a great attraction, on Prospect Road and Highbury Street corner.
- The area around Harvey Street, Nailsworth around 1848 was covered with dense scrub of mostly pines, mallee, peppermint and wattle. Thorngate was open country. Prospect Village was as far north as Pulsford Road.
- A large lake about four feet deep in places existed in the parklands between North Adelaide and Prospect with excellent duck shooting and bathing. Other lakes were formed in the lower portion of the district where water used to flow from the higher levels.
- The first North Adelaide Football Club (Roosters) player to run onto the new Prospect Oval in 1922 was Daniel O'Brien, who lived for over 70 years of his life raising his family in Myrtle Street.
- Camroc Street, Prospect derives its name from a local artist and poet's name spelt backwards – Andrew MacCormac – whose portraits hang in Parliament House, the Art Gallery of South Australia and both Adelaide City and Gawler Council chambers.
- The name "Anzac Day" came about when Mr.
 Robert Wheeler, a draper living in Ballville Street,
 won a competition in 1915. Several other people
 chose the same name in their entries so the winner
 was chosen out of a hat.
- Victoria Cross winner, Major Peter Badcoe, attended Blair Athol Primary School in the 1940's.

CONNECTING THE DOTS FOR MICROBUSINESSES

One of the things we do well as a council is to promote ourselves as a place to do business. It brings investment, employment and prosperity into your area and everyone benefits. But we also have to play the cards we're dealt and we need to be realistic about what can be achieved. Ideally a council would like a large marquee employer like a factory or a callcentre, but in Prospect there are limitedx physical opportunities for those types of businesses to set up.

So I believe it's time we targeted the opposite end of the market. Let's think small. I was a sole trader working from home for over 20 years. Lead generation, networking and skills development are incredibly hard when there's just you and the dog.

I propose that City of Prospect actively seek out these businesses to become the micro-business capital of Australia. Somewhere that if you set up a home-business, not only will you be working in one of the best parts of the world, but you'll have unprecedented support from your Council, with access to casual co-working and conferencing spaces, regular networking events to build your business, plus workshops and seminars to keep you ahead of your competitors.

READY FOR THE SECOND HALF

Stone the Crows; .it's half time in the current council - two years down, and two years to go. At half time in a football game, the team reviews its progress and works out what needs to happen to win the game.

We recently delivered on Tourrific Prospect- a great success despite not having a race start this year. We have been planning for better facilities, including looking at how we can make the Broadview Oval masterplan workable and affordable, how to turn Main North Road into something more than just a national highway, and how to make sure our design rules are fine—tuned so we continue to have properties that are interesting, appropriate and with a bit of soul.

Alan was well known by many for his great conversation on politics and social issues, and was a strong contributor to the Prospect Men's shed. He will be missed, and our thoughts are with Norma and family at this time.







PROPERTY GROWTH ACROSS CITY OF PROSPECT



8.9% SURGE IN CAPITAL GROWTH IN PROSPECT MEDIAN PRICE FOR 2016

A 20% drop in Prospect homes offered for sale in 2016, compared to 2015, fuelled the strong demand for Prospect properties last year. In particular competition for the fewer character older style homes

for sale, both renovated and un-renovated and across all price ranges has in our opinion been the main contributor to the 8.9% growth in median price.

A surge in million dollar plus sales in 2016 reflects both the growing demand for upmarket residences in our very sought after suburbs.

From our experience in and observation of the Prospect market last year, vendors' expectations on sale price were frequently exceeded by buyers prepared to pay a premium for these residences.

All other suburbs in City of Prospect experienced an increase in capital growth in median price in 2016.

Turnover in these suburbs was steady except for Fitzroy which saw a nearly 100% increase in sales from 8 in 2015 to 15 last year.

In the suburb of Prospect which had the largest sales turnover, there were 273 sales of homes and units compared with 266 in 2015. Of the 167 homes sold, almost 50% sold above \$600K. 41 properties sold above \$750K.

Of particular interest were unit sales in Prospect which increased dramatically from 75 in 2015 to 106 in 2016, reflecting the sales of the newly completed units, apartments and townhouses on Churchill and Prospect Roads. Continuing low interest rates and investor activity buoyed by increased capital growth helped support increased prices in the area in 2016.

A surge in million dollar plus sales in 2016 reflects both the growing demand for upmarket residences in our very sought after suburbs as well as the fact that residences of this value are becoming commonplace in the area.

There were 31 million dollar plus sales in the Prospect Council area last year compared with 17 in 2015. Of these 31, 13 were over \$1.25 million compared to 6 in 2015, whilst there were 3 over \$1.5 million. The standout suburb was Fitzroy where 13 of the total 15 sales exceeded one million, while there were 11 million dollar plus sales in the suburb of Prospect.

At Fenwicks we believe 2017 will see continuing strong demand and price increases at least for the first half of the year.

Kate Ellis MP, David O'Loughlin (Mayor of Prospect), Peter Williamson (National Community Enterprises), Jen Bias (DECD) and Rob Trimboli (Spotless), as well as the generous donor businesses.



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


