IN THE GARDEN

By summer your garden will be blossoming and any new plants you planted in spring should be growing well. You still have time to plant new vegetables throughout summer; however hold off planting any new flowering plants as most do not establish well if they are planted during stressful weather.

If you like to grow your own produce during summer, vegetables like broccoli, lettuce, radishes and cucumbers can be planted in this season.

- The easiest way to protect your plants during summer is to mulch well to retain moisture and ensure soil doesn't dry out and harden.
- Potted plants should be moved to a location where they won't dry out.
- Protect new plants with shade cloth.
- Water regularly when temperatures get really hot; early morning or early evening is best.
- For veggie patches, it's a good idea to fertilise with a liquid fertiliser, such as seaweed, every two weeks.

HEALTH & SAFETY TIPS FOR OUR OLDER RESIDENTS

Our elders are particularly vulnerable to heat stress during the hot Summer months so help them to remain safe during extreme heat by taking a few extra precautions -

- Stay hydrated / drink plenty of water.
- Wear loose fitting clothing, preferably cotton; when outside wear a hat.

- Keep cool by closing curtains and blinds during the hottest part of the day.
- Pre-prepare light, healthy meals that don't require cooking.
- Ensure family, friends or neighbours regularly check in on them.
- If the home is not air-conditioned, arrange to spend the day at a friend's home, a nearby shopping centre, or local library.
- Know the signs of heat stroke (confusion, nausea, rapid pulse, high temperature) and seek medical attention if in need.

New Directions for Public Art

ARTS

The inaugural City Wide Public Art Advisory Board (CWPAAB) was endorsed by Council on 10 November 2010.

Its purpose has been 'To oversee and guide the development of a City Wide Public Arts Strategy and assist Council in the future development and placement of public art throughout our City."

Since its establishment it has achieved a number of fantastic public art outcomes, including:

- An upgrade of the Landmark artwork and site with new landscaping and lighting.
- Establishing a 'small' Temporary Public Art Grants Program.
- Restoration of the Joseph Stanislaus Ostoja– Kotkowski (1922–1994) artwork located at 122 Main North Road.
- Updating the Stobie Pole Art Project process.
- Re-establishing the artworks and environment of the Dudley Park Railway Station.



The dual naming of Honeysuckle Lane as KAB101 Lane, to recognise an important local street artist.

- Installation of the Light Box 24/7 Gallery at the rear of Council Chambers.
- Leasing public art works from artists for twelve months to refresh the experience of some of our outdoor public spaces.

In August 2015, the CWPAAB underwent a review with the purpose of ensuring future success

and creditable and achievable public art outcomes for the Community. This will include a new name and terms of reference as well an increase in the representation of artists in the group.

The members who are now responsible for this are Mayor David O'Loughlin, Cr Mark Standen, Katie Harten, Cathy Brooks, Jack Condous, Seb Humphries, Gerry McMahon and Peter Syndicas. Watch this space!

Major Sponsor, Terry Howe Printing, has generously provided sponsorship for the \$5000 Prospect Portrait



2016 Prospect Gallery Program

The 2016 Gallery Program will hit the ground running when the Gallery opens its doors to the Fringe Festival in February! Will it be art or drama, dance or all of the above?

From the chaos that is Fringe, we move into an exhibition of artworks that were conceived during an artist's time in Saudi Arabia. The 'Desert Atlas: Woven from Memory' is an exploration of the 'maps' created by women who weave carpets using patterns that were passed down from generation to generation.

Alexander Arcus' 'Temporal Fragments' is an exhibition of recent paintings consisting of miniature



paintings in gouache on paper and large oil paintings on canvas. The works in the exhibition are largely autobiographical and have an abstract ambiguity intended to permit viewers to bring their personal experiences to a viewing of the work.

From 19 June, 'Beneath the Stone' curated by Lauren Mustillo; showcases up and coming artists Will Mogan, Alycia Bennett, Cam Smith, Claudia Smith, Reb Rowe, Sarah Campbell and Badiucao. This exhibition will explore the relationship between animals and people, using animals as a metaphor.

In August, PAAN, a small but buoyant group teeming with ideas, bring to you an exhibition by current members called 'PAANdemonium'.

In late September we host 'WTF; Wasted,

Treasured, Forgotten'; an exhibition by Kveta Deans, Janice Lane, Anna Mycko, Shelley Li, Kocksi Thoelke, and Jane van Mierle. The artists will create individual works that explore the interface between old and new, the forgotten and the remembered, with their creative journey documented in a journal.

ARTS

In November, 'Outskirts' sees artists Gary Campbell, Jayne Langford and Ewa Skoczynska create an exhibition in which they re-invent objects of no apparent significance into art from items that have been cast adrift.

In December, we close the year with the ever popular 'Prospect Community Show' - an opportunity for those who live or are connected to City of Prospect to exhibit their works in the Prospect Gallery at no cost. Always diverse, always popular, and always worth a look.

Water Saving Tips

Summer is an important time to utilise our water resources efficiently, and one of the best ways to do this is to reduce our use of mains water in the garden. Here are some tips to help:

- Use mulch to prevent water loss through evaporation and prevent soil erosion. Mulch can also help to smother your weeds.
- Plant indigenous native plants for our local area (for more information, visit www.prospect.sa.gov.au).
- Plant your garden in watering zones. Plants that require large amounts of water should be grouped together and will help to reduce your water use.
- Choose a drought resistant lawn that will cope with our harsh, dry conditions.
- Don't over water your lawn train it to use less water by encouraging the roots to grow deeper. Also set your mower level higher during summer and let your lawn grow longer. Keeping grass longer shades the soil surface and reduces evaporation loss.
- Don't water during windy weather water will blow away from where it's needed most.
- Waterproof your terracotta pots before you plant. Terracotta pots are porous and allow the moisture to escape rapidly.
- If you have an outdoor pool or spa keep them covered when not in use. Covers will help prevent water from evaporating.
- Park your car on the lawn before you wash it



and never let water run into the stormwater drain. Alternatively, check out your nearest car washes and find one that recycles its water.

 Instead of hosing, use a broom or rake to clean paths, paved areas and patios.

HELP CARE FOR OUR STREET TREES

DON'T LET STANDBY POWER The most common appliances that use standby power include:

If Council has recently planted a street tree in front of your property, feel free to help nurture it along for a short time by giving it a little extra water during the hot, dry summer months. Council plants over 100 street trees annually and routinely waters them for the first few years after planting however, a little extra water can make all the difference, particularly during the formative years. The rewards will be a happy, healthy, shady tree in years to come that will make a difference to your street and perhaps your wellbeing too.

DRAIN YOUR WALLET

As the weather heats up this summer, our energy usage and subsequently our carbon footprint also increases. If you leave appliances on stand-by you could be unnecessarily adding to your energy bills, and increasing your carbon footprint. Stand-by power is used by appliances when they are not fully switched off, but not performing their main function. If an appliance is not in use and has a red light on, or an internal clock, then it will be using stand-by power.

- computers
- microwaves
- battery chargers
- any appliance with a remote control or an electronic clock built in.

To reduce stand-by power use:

- Turn off appliances at the wall (using power boards can make it easier to turn appliances off).
- Use a stand-by controller to automatically turn off appliances when they are not in use.
- When buying electronic appliances look at the energy rating label.

Parks, playgrounds and recreational facilities are important to you and that's why we are investing further in them in 2015/16. Many of our parks and reserves have had new equipment installed, including furniture, drinking fountains, paths, public art and play equipment, with more exciting upgrades planned for 2016.

We've also added to our list of things to do in City of Prospect with lots of new programs and events to enjoy, including new school holiday shows in the Prospect Town Hall, a "Prospect Professionals" Networking Group and relevant workshops, speed– linking breakfast networking group, workshops to educate local Prospect Businesses about how to harness the opportunities of doing business with China, and a new exercise program for our older residents – just to name a few. Other favourite activities and services are now available more often - did you know the Toy Library is now open during all Library opening hours?

TRANSPORT TO MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS

Some of our older residents struggle to travel to their medical appointments and subsequently, visit a chemist, as part of on-going efforts to maintain their health, remain independent and continue to live in their own homes.

Thanks to a new partnership between Council and Regency Medical Centre on Regency Road these visits will become much easier.

Commencing early January, Council's 10 seat community bus is available (each Wednesday) to pick up residents from their home, drive to the medical service arriving at 10am in time for pre-scheduled appointments with one of the eight doctors available. At the conclusion of the appointments, it's back into the community bus and onto North Park Shopping Centre to visit one of the chemists prior to dropping participants back to their homes.

DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE TELECROSS REDI SERVICE?

During heatwaves the Telecross REDi service supports people by regularly telephoning them. Telecross REDi service is activated when the Adelaide's average daily temperature is 32°C or above for three or more consecutive days (for example, an average of 40°C daytime and 24°C overnight).

Red Cross volunteers call pre-registered clients up to three times a day to check on their wellbeing. The callers ask people how they are coping and remind clients of important measures to assist them through extreme weather.

People in the community who are at risk during extreme weather events and require phone support during these periods are encouraged to register for the service.

OPEN DOOR POLICY AT THE PROSPECT TOWN HALL

Right in the heart of Prospect, on Vine Street Plaza, the front doors of the historic Prospect Town Hall foyer are now open to the public Monday to Friday from 9am until 5pm.

Here you will find:

- Community space
- Public piano
- Take / return / swap books
- Air conditioned foyer
- Public toilets
- Breast-feeding / baby change friendly area
- Recharge point for motorised mobility scooters and mobile devices
- Community notice board



Outside the front doors has been become a fun place for children to play while mum and dad enjoy a cup of coffee, taking in the great community vibe and sunshine. Games of snakes and ladders, hopscotch and chalk boards allow children to play in the shade of the now in-leaf plane trees.

'Take a Book, Share a Book' is a great new initiative of

Prospect Library. Drop into the Town Hall to borrow or swap from the selection of books provided for your enjoyment by our Library staff. A simple book case and an honour system have already resulted in many residents enjoying this service and leaving books for others to enjoy.





This includes people who live alone, have a disability, are experiencing mental illness, are housebound, frail, aged, recovering from an illness or accident, or have an ongoing illness, such as diabetes or a heart condition. Carers of vulnerable people are also encouraged to register as they may be at risk during an extreme weather event too.



A Future Vision for Main North Road

Highway 1 is changing, for the better. Have your say on this exciting, new project.

Main North Road, also known as National Highway 1, is the gateway to and from Adelaide's CBD and northern employment, as well as industrial precincts and tourist links beyond the suburbs. It is also a key corridor for City of Prospect, carrying a constant stream of around 47,600 vehicles through it every day and passing and interacting with over 260 City of Prospect businesses.

Having a main arterial road in our region comes with both advantages and issues.

On the positive side, economic growth indicators for

our part of this road reveal a very low vacancy rate of just 2.56% as at August 2015, demonstrating it is a much sought after location for commercial enterprise.

And while visitation to, and through, our City is always welcomed, it has also somewhat negatively impacted on its sense of place. The face of Main North Road has been changing with the development of urban growth outwards in the north of Adelaide CBD, with the volume of traffic steadily increasing over the past few decades.

Given this, considerable effort is now being directed at strengthening Main North Road's character as a vibrant commercial precinct, with Council currently exploring opportunities to improve the functionality of this road and its offerings.

A Master Plan development for Main North Road is in its early stages and will shape a vision for the road as a commerce–focused arterial route that encourages and provides a range of new employment, business and residential living opportunities, capitalising on the high levels of passing trade.

Council is partnering with its community, investors, Federal and State agencies to plan for, and improve, the amenity and infrastructure of this major corridor. Council's aim is to encourage increased commercial activity, promote excellence in building design, improved pedestrian interaction and amenity, increase the number of street trees, and provide more attractive landscaping.

Community input for the Master Plan will be a three stage process that will result in an agreed vision between the Department of Planning Transport and Infrastructure, Federal Government, City of Walkerville, City of Port Adelaide Enfield, landowners and businesses for the corridor. The vision also aims to meet the goals of the State Government's 30 Year Plan for Greater Adelaide, focusing on the growth and development of this important corridor.

The Main North Road Master Plan will link to, and inform, the future of other relevant Council assets and initiatives including the Thomas St Centre (Prospect's Library, Art Gallery and Digital Hub), Johns Street Depot and the Milk depot.

We encourage you to join the collaborative future planning of economic prosperity for the Main North Road precinct to improve infrastructure, commercial activity, building design, urban amenity and landscaping by taking part in our survey as we really want to hear from you; the people who know the area best.



Another challenge for Prospect Council and its community is "where and what shape will the next Prospect Library take". Being a Friend of Prospect Library member and boardmember of Friends of Libraries Australia, my research emphasises that modern libraries have many different roles. They are multi-faceted places bringing people together as a multi-use destination and lively public-gathering places.

Innovative libraries strengthen language and communication skills among users; are stewards and repositories of local history for following generations and connect people to their communities as civic information centres. Libraries can create a critical mass for retail action such as a local market and café, serving users and residents.

Libraries need to be accessible with convenient transit routes, walkable streets, and adequate bicycle facilities and preferably connect to a green space as well as being ecologically sustainable.

Where would you build our next future public library community centre?

The undergrounding of powerlines along Prospect Road north is already making a difference to the streetscape as are improvements at the southern end of Churchill Road. The rate at which new apartments are springing up on Churchill Road is bringing change, which perturbs some residents in the area perceiving a loss to their amenity, while others see it as an opportunity. Another resident wants better bus-shelter design. Any comments? Happy to assist with both West Ward and across-city matters.

ROLL UP, ROLL UP FOR THE MAIN NORTH EVENT

The time has now come for the City of Prospect's busiest thoroughfare to get a makeover. Main North Road carries more than 47,600* cars per day through our area and is the main link between the city and the north.

Master planning has now commenced and the city will be working closely with neighbouring councils, state departments and the community. As with the upgrades to Prospect and Churchill Roads, there will be extensive research, planning and consultation to deliver better landscaping, infrastructure and amenity to the area.

Main North Road is also our biggest commercial centre with many shops, offices and workshops established along the road. Recent planning changes seek to encourage a greater diversity in the tenant mix and to spark a revitalisation of the road.

Change is already happening with the addition of several new businesses in recent months including the welcome addition of Cafe Basilico to the strip.

Amenity for those who live and work in the area is a key focus for the Master plan. Safe pedestrian and cycle access, vegetation and air quality are top of my concerns and I will be working hard to see these addressed in the planning process.

Historically, Main North Road served as route for bullock trains and today it still serves a gateway to the Barossa, the mid-north and the outback. Tourists travel this route every year but how many are stopping in our fair city? We have a wonderful State Heritage Listed, councilowned tram barn and I wonder how it could be better utilised for the benefit of the area.

URBAN ADVENTURES ON TWO WHEELS

Coming from a big family, a bike was a luxury, so I was 18 when I bought my first bike. I've always had one since, but have really only ridden it when the bloke and I took the kids out on weekend rides. To build their confidence, we would avoid the busier roads such as Prospect Rd, Churchill Rd and even Braund Rd. It became an adventure in itself to find routes that would allow the kids to build their skills and help us teach them the fine art of considerate cycling; giving signals, observing road rules and understanding the vulnerability of being a cyclist.

Recently, a friend and I have rediscovered the benefits of cycling. While I've been showing her my old routes, we have braved more direct routes to our destinations along busy streets and have been amazed at the thoughtless behaviour from fellow cyclists and motorists alike. While most people do their best to do the right thing, a little more awareness from both camps wouldn't go astray.

The implementation of the Braund Road Bicycle Boulevard is hopefully a way of raising this awareness. Although called a Bicycle Boulevard, the intention is not to prioritise one mode of transport over the other, but rather to provide a low-speed environment for the safety of cyclists, pedestrians and motorists alike. Raised intersections, bicycle markings (known as sharrows) and improved signage are designed to encourage all commuters to learn the fine art of consideration from each other.

A Bicycle Boulevard is a welcome and perhaps, long overdue project. While we still have some time until its completion, let's all try a bit more consideration towards each other in sharing our roads. With summer holidays upon us, some better modelling for our young people wouldn't go astray.

JUST TALKIN' RUBBISH...

In what will come as no surprise to many people, I'm about to talk rubbish. Or more specifically, rubbish bins. Let's face it, the 'One Solution Fits All' model doesn't work that well.

It's because my needs are different to my neighbour's, and even mine change throughout the year. Over Christmas I need another three recycling bins and I rarely put out the green bin. Families have different needs to singles or the aged, and so on.

So why do we have this waste model if it's so rubbish? Mostly cost, but partly because the waste contractors set up the models to suit their own practicalities and not ours. We're then locked into an inflexible solution for years and wonder why people complain.

The solution is fantastically simple.

You decide which bins you put out each week. Your choice. One, none or all. Green, yellow, red, whatever. No schedule. We would set you up an overall 'bin budget' of say 104 pickups a year (two bins a week), but then it's up to you. No more one size fits all.

I would expect a decrease in waste to landfill as people learn to manage their waste in their own way. For example, I personally would use the yellow bin weekly. And if the current model does already work well for you, good news, continue doing that. Simple.

If we're clever, we may not need to increase the weekly 'truck runs'. How about a single truck that can accept both the green and yellow bin on the same run? Let's see some imagination from the contractors.

When our current contract is up next year, I want to see offerings that are flexible enough to suit every resident, not a compromise. Let's be leaders. Let's innovate.

Until then, have a lovely Christmas time and

I'm proud of them because they embraced change which was both difficult and scary.

When I was driving around with my Dad in his Valiant station wagon, council workers were the butt of everybody's jokes. Some decades later I found myself in charge of Infrastructure Assets and Environment and teams of council workers. I remembered what Dad used to say and I wanted to change that stereotype, change the practices and break forever the image of the Australian council worker leaning on his shovel, with a fag hanging are even equipped now to bring work in from other, less efficient councils if we want to.

In the 1970s, when my hard-working Greek father drove past a gang of council workers, he would say to me, "Grigori, look at those bludgers. They don't know how to work." But if he drove past one of our Prospect City Maintenance teams today, he would see a well-organised, proactive, doublyskilled and strategically-oriented group of people. I could look him in the eye and say, "Dad, we're the best at what we do. We know what we're doing, we're good, we're thorough, we're quick and we don't waste money."

OUR LIBRARY

Technology in every book

The RFID system (coming in January 2016) replaces the current barcode system and scanner by utilising an RFID reader and microchip to identify items.

All South Australian public libraries are placing special microchips, known as RFID (radio frequency identification) tags on all items. The tags are central to a new digital system that allows:

- Rapid item checkout and check in
- The collection to be kept in better order
- Customers to self-checkout their own items and review their Library account
- Better overall stock control

What is **RFID**?

Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) uses electronic tags attached to an item to enable identification from a distance without a direct line–of–sight. This is achieved using invisible radio waves over distances ranging from millimetres to hundreds of metres. Within a library, the RFID system replaces the current barcode system and scanner by utilising an RFID reader and microchip to identify items.

How does RFID work?

RFID works by sending and receiving information via radio waves using Radio Frequency (RF) tags and Radio Frequency (RF) readers to transfer data. The RF tag receives radio frequency waves from the RF reader, using the energy from these waves to broadcast back the information located on its microchip via its tiny, built–in antenna.

How will City of Prospect Library use it?

As well as the familiar barcodes, all our items now have an RFID tag. The tag allows library staff to quickly and accurately 'check in' resources as well as lend items out. In addition, our Library will have a 'Self Loan Station' that allows customers to checkout multiple items quickly and easily themselves – and be able to check their account.

How will I check out my items?

We will be encouraging all customers to use the Self



Loan Station which provides library customers with a fast and simple check out service. Multiple items can be borrowed in the one process. With customers utilising the Self Loan Station, library staff will have more time to offer their skills and knowledge towards a greater number of beneficial and informative programs on the library floor, ultimately providing greater value to the Prospect community.

What about returns?

Items will still be returned in the same way through the return chutes. No change.

Will there be less staff to help me?

No. This technology has been introduced to improve customer service. Along with our collections, our staff are our best asset and will continue to help you. RFID technology simply provides our staff with an extremely effective means of managing the library collection, along with efficiently handling large numbers of loans and returns. You may like to ask staff to show you how to use the new self–loan kiosk, which they will be very happy to do, as many times as you need.
