

PROSPECT'S INTELLIGENT COMMUNITY CELEBRATED ON GLOBAL STAGE

Ometimes it's so easy to get caught up in the day to day, you forget just how far you've come.

Recently we have been provided with an opportunity to reflect on City of Prospect's social and digital successes when we were named as a finalist in the global Intelligent Community of the Year Awards.

The Intelligent Communities Forum (ICF) is a global network that connects cities and regions across five continents to collaborate on economic development and community growth in the digital age. Each year, the ICF crowns one city its Intelligent Community of the Year.

City of Prospect's journey began earlier this year when the council area was selected as one of the Top 7 Intelligent Community Finalists. Through our many interviews with community members, including artists, residents, school students, businesses, Members of Parliament and CEOs, we were again reminded of those within our community whose passion, talent, and drive has contributed to making Prospect the vibrant urban hotspot it is.

At October's Intelligent Community Forum Global Summit in Ohio, our delegates were invited to speak on the development of our community and the benefits of collaboration. We received a lot of interest in our innovative businesses, sustainable solutions and pioneering community that have revolutionised Prospect.

Although City of Prospect didn't win Intelligent Community of the Year (Congratulations to the winner, New Taipei, Taiwan!), we were both honoured and humbled to be in the running. Being named a Top 7 finalist represents that we are charting new paths to lasting prosperity for our residents, businesses and institutions. We appreciated the opportunity to showcase our intelligent community on the global stage, and to reflect on the transformation Prospect has undergone.



While looking back has made us proud, with a community as unique, eclectic, innovative and, of course, intelligent as ours, the future for Prospect is even more exciting.






















MAYOR'S MESSAGE

The opportunity to lead your council for 16 years has been an extraordinary privilege.

Working together we have achieved so much: a vibrant Village Heart, a beautified Churchill Road and Devonport Terrace precinct, undergrounding of power lines and beautification of Prospect Road, the upgrade and creation of many new play spaces, the consolidation of staff and services in the wonderful Payinthi building, and the soon-to-commence Broadview Community and Sports Hub redevelopment.

We have become more inclusive in our decision making, with extensive community consultation on everything from annual budgets to playground upgrades to our largest building projects. Did you know we implemented a 15-person Community Reference Group to help guide the decision making making on our Payinthi project? Similarly for the Devonport Terrace upgrade and the Broadview Community Hub

redevelopment. We are now a hands on decision-making community.

We are still the only council in South Australia to have optic fibre to every single home and business across the city. We are safely future proofed in this regard.

Botanic High School and being (mostly) included in the highly sought-after city school zone was another major achievement on behalf of terrific local activists like Catherine Symes. You may recall I ran for state parliament in 2014, but did you know I refused to run unless Labor promised a second city high school? Then-Premier Weatherill himself made the promise to me. Labor won, funding and constructing the \$100 million school almost exactly where I asked for it, resolving a decades-old shortfall.

Sharing the bouquets and also retiring is longserving Councilor Allen Harris, much loved for his passion for many causes including our work with native title holders the Kaurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation, listening and learning how we can form a local treaty to guide collective decision making in future. The very talented Councilor Steven Rypp is also retiring having recently relocated to nearby Town of Walkerville, hopefully to continue to make a positive impact.


My sincere thanks to the elected members who have served us all, and to the staff and CEOs over my tenure. Thank you so much.

OPEN SPACE UPGRADES

Parks and reserves have been shown to improve social cohesion, encourage social interaction with those outside our regular social circles, support community mental health and promote active living.

Open green spaces also provide many environmental benefits, including lowering the temperature of their surroundings.

Whether you use one of Prospect's 24 parks and gardens as a place to gather with friends, a safe space for your children to play in, or to maintain an active lifestyle, we're committed to providing our residents and visitors with improved open spaces.

RL PASH RESERVE

We are pleased to announce RL Pash Reserve (corner Collins St and D'Erlanger Ave, Collinswood) is now in the planning stages for an upgrade with community consultation to commence in late October to work with the community to develop a design. We will also develop a stormwater solution that has been identified at this park as part of our endorsed Stormwater Management Plan which will add to broader water quality benefits downstream.

PERCY STREET RESERVE

The upgrade at Percy Street Reserve (65 Percy Street, Prospect) now has a draft concept design prepared from two rounds of consultation with the community and stakeholders. We identified the importance of considering the straightening of the reserve's western boundary to ensure our community feels safe when using the park, the result of which may alter the current draft design.

Staff have progressed negotiations with the property owner impacted and a way forward will be presented to Council in the coming months.

PEPPERMINT GUMS RESERVE

We are also planning the upgrade for Peppermint Gums Reserve (Corner Dean St and Barker Rd, Prospect). We recently ran a second round of consultation on a draft concept plan. The draft concept plan included new play equipment, sheltered family picnic area, BBQ, multi-use court and a looped running/walking track. We are currently finalising the design based on the feedback received and will prepare costings for construction for Council's consideration in the 2023/24 financial year. MATTHEWS RESERVE

At the August Council meeting, the decision was made to put the Matthews Reserve upgrade on hold until next financial year, and to instead focus our resources and budget on the planning and design of RL Pash Reserve. This decision was made as a result of receiving \$250,000 of State Government funding towards RL Pash Reserve, as part of an election promise to the local community and Member of Parliament Lucy Hood.

IRISH HARP RESERVE

There has been a slight delay in the commencement of construction on Irish Harp Reserve (350 Regency Road, Prospect). We now expect construction to commence in the second quarter of 2023. For the latest information on this project, visit **prospect**. **sa.gov.au/irish-harp-reserve-upgrade**

Broadview Community and Sports Hub construction commencing

he Broadview Community and Sports Hub redevelopment is an exciting project for our community. Following extensive community consultation and planning, construction will commence in late 2022 and is scheduled for completion by late 2023.

Broadview's suburban character is known for its leafy eucalyptus trees, green grass and natural earth tones, which has influenced the design of the new Broadview Community and Sports Hub.

The new building will encompass two levels, providing the community with multiple views of both the oval and surrounding park areas. Level one will feature full-height windows and balcony featuring glass balustrades, allowing for uninterrupted views of the oval in the foreground and rolling hills in the background. The upper-level features a for-hire function space with the flexibility to be split into two, supporting increased community use, along with a kitchen, bar and additional amenities.

An exciting new feature is the provision of additional changerooms and amenities to support increasing participation in football, particularly for women.

Other additions include a gymnasium available for community use, modern home-and-away changerooms, a medical room, two accessible toilets and a café/kiosk. The ground floor main entry is easily accessible through an automatic sliding door, while level one can be accessed either via the internal stairs or lift, or externally using stairs on the oval side of the facility.

When the redevelopment is completed, the new community asset will perfectly suit its surrounding urban and landscape identity with natural materials and hues, art deco influences, Australian eucalypt tones, sandstone and a greying tree bark colour palette.

This is an exciting time for the City of Prospect, and a great opportunity for the community to benefit from this investment.

While the new hub will provide a reinvigorated home for the mighty Broadview Football Club, the community space on level one provides flexible options for community groups to casually hire this space.

Community groups are invited to nominate their interest in hiring the function space within the building. Council staff are available to discuss ideas and thoughts further.

LET'S AVOID, REDUCE, RE-USE, RECYCLE AND COMPOST THIS CHRISTMAS!



Avoid

- 7/10 Australians received at least one unwanted gift at Christmas. Find out what your family and friends really want or consider an experience gift instead.
- Buy only what you need. Make a shopping list and avoid the deals.
- Opt for a real tree over plastic! It'll fill your home with a fresh pine scent and can be either mulched or cut up and disposed of via your green bin post-festivities.
- Let people serve themselves to avoid over-catering.
- Store leftovers efficiently. Store food in airtight containers, keep fruit and veg in the fridge and freeze food near its use-by date.

Reduce

- Save time, money and hassle by embracing the Kris Kringle method and purchase one quality gift per person.
- Provide rechargeable batteries and a recharger pack with any battery-operated gifts. It will save money longer-term and ensure that less batteries are used.

Re-use

- Buy quality decorations that can be reused for multiple years.
- Consider making your own Christmas decorations using natural materials such as gumnuts, shells and pinecones.
- Make your own Christmas cards using anything from magazine clippings to pressed flowers.
- Create unique wrapping paper using brown craft paper and potato stamps. This makes a great holiday activity for kids!
- Purchase pre-loved gifts and items made from recycled materials.

Recycle

- Recycle bottles and jars (plastic and glass), cards, cans, foil trays (give then a quick clean first), cardboard boxes (crush them down to make more room in the bin), foil wrappers (scrunched into a fist sized ball), milk, juice and custard cartons, tins and paper wrapping paper.
- Cellophane can be recycled in the REDCycle bins found at Coles and Woolworths.
- Rinse and empty containers before placing them in the recycle bin.

 Place items in loose and not in a plastic bag.

Compost

- Fruit and vegetable scraps can be composted or added to your worm farm.
- Place food scraps including meat, seafood, bones and dairy, unwanted leftoyers or spoilt

leftovers or spoilt food in your green bin.

 To avoid the smells from seafood and food scraps in the bin, wrap them in newspaper and store in the freezer until the night before your bin collection. Place a reminder on your fridge or bin so you don't forget to pop them in the green bin.



Cities Power Partnership pledge



City of Prospect is looking forward to working with more than 170 councils across Australia to tackle climate change locally and promote sustainability within our community as part of the Cities Power Partnership.

With an aim of a zero-carbon emissions future, the Cities Power Partnership focuses on supporting and celebrating local councils across the country who succeed in reducing community carbon emissions.

As part of the partnership, local councils are asked to make five pledges within the categories of renewable energy, efficiency, transport and working in partnership.

Council recently met to decide on the five pledges City of Prospect will work towards as part of the partnership.

Our pledges are:

- 1. Install renewable energy (solar PV and battery storage) on council buildings.
- 2. Adopt best-practice energy efficiency

- measures across all council buildings, and support community facilities to adopt these measures.
- 3. Roll out energy efficient lighting across the municipality.
- Ensure council fleet purchases meet strict greenhouse gas emissions requirements and support the uptake of electric vehicles.
- Encourage sustainable transport use such as public transport, walking and cycling through council transport planning and design.

To deliver on our pledges, we plan to undertake an energy audit of council buildings, install renewable energy as council building assets are upgraded, and investigate the rollout of LED lighting across all streetlights.

A championship year for Prospect Petangue Club

The unlikely sport of petanque is putting Prospect on the map!

A type of bowls originating from France, it's a game that can be played at any age and without prevous experience, Allan Sanderson, prominent Prospect Petanque Club member, says.

Taking over the vacant Prospect Gardens Women's Bowling Club in Buchanan Street more than 25 years ago, Prospect Petanque Club was founded in 1996.

Now, the club is celebrating their latest victories, having recently won a number of statewide and national competitions.

Allan believes the success of the club has been building for the last two years, and is owed in part to a local family.

"The club was fortunate to secure the membership of the Nguyen family from Vietnam, in particular Van Nguyen who was a member of the Vietnamese National Petanque training squad. Van's wife, Ha Nguyen, has also returned to playing," Allan said

"Van's presence at club practice and on match days has inspired other members to become more focused on their own training and competitive play."

Two club members, Melissa and Gavin Scott, have spent as much time as possible practising and playing with Van.

Melissa in particular has benefitted from the coaching, going from never having played competitive sport to winning the South Australian Women's Championship two years in a row, and her team placing second at the 2022 National Women's Triples Title.

Van has also enjoyed success since joining the club, having won multiple statewide championships, including the Men's Precision Shooting Title and the SA Men's Singles Championship. He also won the National Open Triples Championship with fellow club member Gavin Scott, and friend Harold Dercy from Sydney.

The local club has also pioneered a unique 'Six a Side' competition, which has brought them further success.

"Our games are usually played in the doubles format, with some competitions in the state leage played in teams of three," Allan said.

"The success of our six-person team in the last two years has widened our base of quality players who enjoy the winning success and the comradery of playing in a larger team environment.

"It's not easy to win. It took Prospect seven years to win our first sixer competition. Now we don't want to let the title go!"

As thoughts turn to Christmas, we look back to 1915 during a time when the people of Australia banded together to send some festive cheer to troops in the Dardanelles.

Organisations such as the Red Cross and the Australian Comforts Funds helped add to the festivities in the form of care parcels. One of the most popular in the First World War was the Christmas billy, given to Australian soldiers in December 1915 together with a plum pudding.

The billies were mostly compiled by families back home in Australia -

including a contribution from Mrs A Wilson of Clifton Street in Prospect.

Mrs Wilson's billy was gratefully received by Lance Corporal N. R. McKinnon, 24th Battalion, 6th Brigade, who wrote:

"This is the first opportunity I have had for answering letters for some weeks, and I thought I could not do better than thank you for your gift 'billy' before I answered my other correspondence.

"The 'billy' came to hand on Christmas Day. We were camped on Lemnos Island then having evacuated the Peninsula a few days previously.

"After a stay of about two weeks, we left Lemnos, and are now in Egypt, preparing f or a Turkish advance on Suez.

Well, my dear friend, I must conclude, as we have not much time for letter writing now; but I will write more fully later. Thanks very much again."

The call for Christmas billy cans had gone out in October 1915, with some interesting guidelines, including painting the cans a dull brown so the glittering tin didn't attract enemy fire.

As for the contents, the instructions were explicit:

"It is thought this billy should contain – (1) chocolate, (2) tobacco in tins, (3) cigarettes in tins, (4) pipe, (5) dried fruits in tins, nuts, (6) game, puzzle, or musical instrument. List of other articles suitable to send in billy: Playing cards, simple housewives (a type of sewing kit), pocket mirror, boot laces, cigarette papers, watch straps, safety pins, cigarette lighters, post cards, indelible pencils, pen knives, small books, cheese, butter scotch in tins, sweets, figs or prunes in tins, cocoa, soup tablets, chicken essence, sardines, potted meats, bonbons.

As fun is the spirit of a Christmas packet, include plenty of jokes, funny riddles, sketches, limericks, mouth organs.

A post card addressed to yourself might be returned by the man in the trench. Write a note, it is usually appreciated. Pack tightly. Fill in any spaces with tissue paper, which is useful. Send cigarettes and tobacco in tins not paper."

Sesquicentenary

This year marked the sesquicentenary (150th anniversary) of City of Prospect.

The greater Prospect area was originally part of the District Council of Yatala, a large council area that struggled to maintain roads and bridges with the rates that were paid. As time progressed, boundary changes were made, and new councils created to adequately cater to the growing needs of residents and traders.

Residents of Prospect were concerned they were being forgotten, and their rates were not being invested into local infrastructure to support them. A petition was circulated, followed by a counter petition, but eventually the decision was made for the greater Prospect area to have its own council.

On August 11872, the new District

Council of Prospect was proclaimed, and the first meeting was held on August 5 1872.

Fast-forward 150 years, and we've celebrated this milestone with a variety of activities, including a jampacked History Month in May, and the Mayor's dinner in August marked the momentous occasion with a sesquicentenary theme.

The wider community has also celebrated the 150th anniversary of City of Prospect. Prospect Theatre for Young People worked throughout the year to create a play that celebrated snippets of our local history, allowing local children to learn more about the origins of our city.

We've enjoyed looking back on the history of our council and look forward to seeing what the future brings.

COMMUNITY ART CHAMPIONED BY LOCAL FOOTBALL CLUB



A stobie pole at Prospect Oval has been given a facelift thanks to artist Diana Waters, community footy fanatics, and a City of Prospect Public Art Grant.

Artist Diana Waters was engaged by council to restore the original Prospect stobie pole art, which was championed by artist and local resident Ann Newmarch in 1982.

Diana, who has gained a reputation across South Australian councils as an artist with the skills and talent required to repair stobie pole art, worked with passionate North Adelaide Football Club supporters after they recently requested council revitalise the vibrant art.

The stobie pole is a valued community tribute to footy legends Barrie Charles Robran and Ian Lawson McKay.

Barrie Charles Robran, Member of the Order of British Empire, is a former Australian rules footballer who represented North Adelaide in the South Australian National Football League (SANFL) from 1967 - 1980. He won South Australian football's highest individual honour, the Magarey Medal, on three occasions – 1968, 1970 and 1973.

lan (9 March 1923 – 3 April 2010) was also an Australian rules footballer who played with North Adelaide in the SANFL. He played a total of 164 games for North Adelaide.


