At only 22, Eleanor is a great community role model to her peers.

Santa's Coming to Prospect – 2023 Community Event of the Year

Watching the community come together over music and markets whilst supporting local businesses is what Stephanie Ferretti, the powerhouse behind Santa's Coming To Prospect, enjoys most about volunteering. Launching in 2017 and steadily growing year after year, Santa's Coming To Prospect has become a regular fixture in our city's Christmas calendar. Pop-up markets alongside the cave further encourage the community to come together, creating a vibrant atmosphere.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

Recently, I celebrated my 18th month as City of Prospect's Chief Executive Officer.

Reflecting on my first year and a half, I'm incredibly proud of what we have achieved for our community. We've recruited a strong Executive Leadership Team, who have hit the ground running and are working hard to create effective teams, capitalise on opportunities and deliver on key projects and objectives.

In October, we joined over 6,000 locals and visitors in celebrating the return of the Spring Fair, our first since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. November saw Prospect take to the polls and elect a new Mayor and Council.

In January, the 2023 Citizen of the Year Awards were presented to four deserving women who've each made standout contributions to our community. The much-loved Twilight Sessions returned to Prospect Memorial Gardens for its 28th year, and the annual Prospect Fringe once again electrified our main street during February and March. Our Prospect Toy Library was also nominated for the nationwide 'Best Medium Toy Library' award for 2023.

Several large-scale projects have commenced or been completed. With the sod turning event behind us on the \$5.2m Broadview Community and Sports Hub project, construction commenced at the start of the year. While this project provides a reinvigorated home for the mighty Broadview Football Club, the community space on level one will also provide flexible casual hire options as well as a new food and beverage experience for the east of our council once delivered towards the end of 2023.

In January, the State Government, in partnership with North Adelaide Football Club and council, unveiled the \$1.5m redevelopment of Prospect Oval/Payinthi Yarta, home of the

North Adelaide Roosters. As part of the project, women's change rooms have been established to support increasing female participation in football, as well as an upgraded gym, brand new restaurant, and function facilities available for community hire.

Ovingham Overpass was unveiled in February, the result of a \$196m commitment from both State and Federal Governments to upgrading public transport facilities and improving traffic flow on our city's southwestern border. Don't the community facilities delivered with this project look amazing? If you haven't already, it's worth a visit to look at the play spaces, passive recreational areas, artworks, and new landscape that have been created.

We know, from community feedback, that we've got a lot of things right, and I want to acknowledge how we got here. We want to continue building on Prospect because we should always be ambitious and strive for more, because our community deserves our very best.

Looking ahead, we're hitting major milestones in the next six months. A concept plan for the future upgrade of RL Pash Reserve is being developed, based on your feedback. The draft concept plan for Peppermint Gums Reserve is also due to be finalised, following two rounds of consultation. Irish Harp Reserve's redevelopment will commence mid-year, with Percy Street Reserve's upgrade at that time also. More information on these projects can be found on page 12. As part of our Renewal Programs, we'll also continue to improve and restore kerbs, gutters and roads in our suburban streets that are part of our community's every day. We know these matter to you.

We'll soon begin shaping our Strategic Community Plan, our most critical of all council strategies as it will provide us with direction as we make decisions which impact on the wider Prospect community. I'd like to thank the more than 600 residents, ratepayers and visitors who provided their feedback on what they felt to be their top priority for council to focus on. It's fantastic to have such an engaged community. Stay tuned for more information on the next phase of consultation, where we'll ask residents and rate payers to express their interest in reviewing the document by visiting cityofprospect.engagementhub.com.au.

We're continuing our commitment to maintaining quality services and facilities for our community. As such, we're developing our draft Annual Business Plan and Budget 2023-24. This plan will set out the key projects, priorities, and services that will be delivered in the next financial year and how we propose to achieve this. This project will also be on Engagement Hub shortly, where we will be seeking your feedback.

Finally, we'll continue onboarding and empowering your elected representatives, ensuring they have the knowledge and skills to represent your views effectively and accurately. I encourage you to read the Elected Members' visions for 2023 on pages 6 and 7.

While we are already a strong organisation, we have further solidified our vision based directly on your input. We have an exciting journey ahead of us to make this vision a reality, and I look forward to working closely with the Prospect community, its elected representatives, and council staff to ensure positive outcomes for our community.

COUNCILLOR VISIONS FOR 2023

Voting in the 2022 Local Government elections closed on 10 November.

Four Elected Members were re-elected – Thuy Nguyen (North Ward), Kristina Barnett (West Ward) and Mark Groote and Alison De Backer (Central Ward). Four new Elected Members were welcomed – Jason Nelson (North Ward), Trinh Nguyen (West Ward) and Lillian Hollitt and Mark Standen (East Ward). In their first few months on council, we asked each Elected Member 'What is your vision for our community in 2023?' Here's what they said below.

"IT TOOK VOLUNTEERING TO MEET SOMEONE ON THE SAME STREET AS ME!"

Despite sharing the same name, Sophie Harris and Sophie Summers began volunteering at City of Prospect for very different reasons.

After being diagnosed with a brain tumour, Sophie Harris had to leave her career in childcare. Suddenly finding herself with a lot of extra time, her father, who was a member of council at the time, suggested she get involved in volunteering with council in 2017. Six years later, Ms Harris now assists staff in running both Friendship Group bingo sessions for older residents on Tuesday mornings and Story Time for pre-schoolers on Wednesdays.

Sophie Summers began her volunteer journey working with children at the Women's and Children's Hospital in the Paediatric Outpatient Department (POPD). While rewarding both personally and professionally, she began seeking volunteering opportunities locally to work better with her university schedule.

Ms Summers began volunteering at Prospect

Library in 2020, where she too assisted in running Wednesday Story Time sessions.

Reflecting on how they met, Ms Harris remembers being introduced to Ms Summers.

"I was told there was a new volunteer starting and was asked if I'd like to meet her. I said 'Hi, I'm Sophie', and she said, 'My name's Sophie too!"

The girls quickly discovered they had more in common than a first name; they lived on the same street in Nailsworth, and their birthdays were within a day of each other's.

Three years later, their initial meeting has developed into a close friendship.

"Now, every Wednesday morning before we go to Story Time, we walk around the North Adelaide horse paddocks. We've just become so close," Ms Harris said.

"It was so strange. We lived on the same street but had no idea about each other!" Ms Summers laughed.

Reflecting on her volunteering, Ms Summers is glad she made the move closer to home. Along with gaining valuable experience she hopes to one day utilise in her occupational therapy career, she enjoys knowing that she's helping other people.

"If you find something you enjoy volunteering for, it just feels like you're having fun and filling your day with something you enjoy," Ms Summers said.

Echoing her sentiments, Ms Harris added that volunteering had helped her too, and gave her the push she needed to get out of the house and involved in her local community.

"You get to meet so many different people. It just gives my life more joy," Ms Harris said.

However, the friendship the two women have found in one another was at the top of their respective lists.

"It's such a good friendship that Soph and I have gained from this, and to think, if we didn't meet at the library, we probably never would've met!" Ms Summers said.

"You couldn't have scripted it more!"

PROSPEROUS PROSPECT



Over the past two decades, Prospect has risen to take its place as one of Adelaide's finest city fringe suburbs, bringing to fruition years of careful planning and collaboration.

New urban corridor planning zones have enabled more residents to move into medium and high-rise dwellings, bringing with them a younger demographic and innovative start-up businesses. Prospect has evolved into a desirable and enviable location, providing high level of work-life balance complementing a vibrant environment to study, connect, visit and play.

While Prospect Road's high street is the true heartbeat of Prospect, this energy is now flowing into to other main road precincts, which are evolving with their own style and unique characteristics.

It was this enviable lifestyle opportunity that drew City of Prospect's new Director City Growth and Development **John Pearce** and his family back from Victoria. Having spent his career driving economic retail and property value for corporate firms, John is now invested in Prospect's long-term prosperity. We sat down with John and talked about his vision for Prospect's prosperity evolution.

Prospect Road is undoubtably the jewel in our crown. What do you attribute our main street's success to?

Local investors and businesses have seen the enormous potential in this leafy treelined suburb on the doorstep of a world class city. With only parklands separating Prospect from leading universities, our state's health precinct, and a transformed Adelaide Oval, they saw intrinsic value here.

Collaboration between council, planning authorities and business slowly realised the vision by advocating for appropriate zoning to ensure medium and high density living. This vision anticipated a changing local demographic, bringing with it new tastes, desires and needs.

This collaborative approach has since paid dividends in the form of a vibrant and active main street, anchored by Schinella's Market and Maras Group's Palace Nova Cinema complex at one end, and council's state-of-the-art Payinthi building at the other. In between lies our Village Heart, offering dynamic retail and dining options and essential community services.

The strip is also becoming increasingly diverse. In the last six months alone, we've welcomed REVL Training to our main street, as well as Hand Me Down Heat, which specialises in curated men's vintage clothing and accessories. At the other end of the spectrum, Leo's Bar & Pizza, has called Prospect Road home since 1975! This blend of local favourites along with fresh retail options acts as a magnet for locals and visitors alike.

Opportunities to invest in our Village Heart real estate are rare, and investors remain hungry for a piece of Prospect. In December 2022, the former Australia Post office site at 91 Prospect Road was auctioned for a record \$4m.

You mentioned investors are becoming increasingly keen to be a part of our Village Heart. What's drawing their eyes north of the city?

We've all known how great Prospect is for a while now, but in the past five years, we're seeing that reputation continue to grow and be rewarded at an industry level too.

Mainstreet SA inducted Prospect Road into the Mainstreet SA Hall of Fame in 2021, off the back of being awarded the People's Choice Award in 2019 and 2020 consecutively. We also won the Best COVID-19 Response Award, thanks to the previous council's decisive action at the beginning of the pandemic to launch Prospect Delivers, which provided vulnerable and elderly residents with \$25 vouchers to spend at local restaurants

and cafes pivoting to an outdoor dining or takeaway delivery system. Not only did this scheme keep income circulating within our local economy, but it also kept our main street vacancy rates at a record low while many other main streets sadly suffered. More recently, council's relationship with emerging businesses has seen us named a Small Business Friendly Council by the South Australian Small Business Commissioner.

We're also being recognised at a global level, which is very exciting. City of Prospect was named a Top 7 Intelligent Community by the Intelligent Community Forum in the USA in late 2022, and the development and innovation seen along Prospect Road played a huge part in that, a great local example being Little City Coworking.

We're beginning to see the success of Prospect Road spread to all corners of our community. Where's the next hot spot?

The southern end of Churchill Road has become a thriving hidden secret, and residents are beginning to see an emergence of new retail and service precincts.

In the past decade, nearly 1000 new apartments have been erected, many nearby Charles Cane Reserve/Parndo Yerta. To cater to the influx of apartment residents around this precinct reserve, there's a real cosmopolitan feel now as the business community respond to market demand. Opposite Charles Cane there are delicious Vietnamese baguettes, Italian cannoli at the southern end next to the recently completed nature playground, mouth-watering New York bagels to the north at Frankly, and delicious Greek Yiros at Zeus just down the street. A lovely sight to enjoy is watching happy families enjoying the perfect balance of economic prosperity and optimal social amenities.

Main North Road is also seeing an emergence in new commercial opportunities. This year, Aldi have opened a new location at the old Radio Rental's site at 110 Main North Road, offering yet another supermarket option for residents.

We've seen a huge influx of residents moving into Prospect, including yourself. What's putting Prospect on the map?

Most I've spoken to agree that priorities shifted during and after the pandemic. Undeniably there is now an economic value placed on the balance our beautiful city has to offer. We have great restaurant options, coffee within walking distance (important for

those working from home!) and the ability to meet and chat with neighbours while out walking the dog in our multitude of parks and open spaces. The leafy, village feel is symbolic and meets a fundamental need for us as human beings and social creatures. Prospect has all of that and more, and it's this lifestyle that people are capitalising on. Our desire is to continue to facilitate this growth while fiercely protecting what makes Prospect great, including our advocacy for stronger protection of historical character and heritage buildings.

Much like where I came from in Brunswick, Richmond and Fitzroy in Melbourne, Prospect has everything needed to live, work, learn and play locally, yet enjoys a premium village feel. Finally, our proximity to the city is a major drawcard, with efficient public transport options meaning you can be on North Terrace within 10 minutes.

OPEN SPACE UPGRADES

Projects in design phase

RL Pash Reserve

Corner D'Erlanger Avenue and Collins Street, Collinswood

Following the first round of community consultation, a concept plan is being developed for the future upgrade of RL Pash Reserve. The community will be invited to provide feedback on the draft concept plan to inform the final design. The Government of South Australia have generously provided \$250,000 funding contribution for this project, from an election promise made by Member for Adelaide Lucy Hood.

Peppermint Gums Reserve

Corner Dean Street and Barker Road, Prospect

A second round of community consultation was undertaken in late 2022 to gather feedback on a draft concept plan. The proposed concept plan includes improving both access through the park and overall safety, particularly to the back corner of the park. The upgrade will include new adventure play equipment, nature play, accessible looped path, a sheltered BBQ area, improved entrance points and a fitness area with a small court. There was a high level of support for the draft concept plan, with all elements being supported by most respondents. We are finalising the concept plan, including costing the plan to allow future annual budget consideration for its delivery.

Irish Harp Reserve


350 Regency Road, Prospect

We are excited to (finally!) have a date to begin the delivery of Irish Harp Reserve. The upgrade is planned to commence midyear and include a new play tower, flying fox, nature play, shelter with BBQ, mixed-use court, improved lawn space for ball games, feature artwork, and improved access and safety.

Percy Street Reserve

65 Percy Street, Prospect

At the end of 2022, council resolved to keep the western boundary alignment



of the reserve in its current location and endorsed the final concept design at the January 2023 Council Meeting. The upgrade will include new play equipment, an improved native garden, fencing, solar light, and an accessible looped path, while we retain an open lawn area. We are now in the final stages of design, ready to begin construction mid-year.

To keep across construction timeframes and reserve closure dates, visit **prospect.sa.gov. au**, follow us on social media **(@cityofprospect)** or keep an eye out for posters at these locations.

All residents living near the reserves will be notified prior to works commencing. We acknowledge these works may be an inconvenience to visitors during the construction stage but are confident the new facilities at each park will provide much greater use and will have something for everyone.

Alternate reserves to enjoy during the construction works:

Nearby parks to Irish Harp Reserve:

- Prospect Estate (286 Prospect Road, Prospect) - a predominantly passive park with a serene waterway, minor play equipment, BBQ and toilet facilities.
- Stan Watson Reserve (95 Charles Street, Prospect) – upgraded in 2019, this fenced park has a play space catering for all ages and a small lawn area for games.

Nearby parks to Percy Street Reserve:

- Ern Sconce Rotary Park (26 Alexandra Street, Prospect) – a native park with a nature trail, play space, BBQ, and half-court basketball facilities.
- Matthews Reserve (corner Struan Avenue and Moore Street, Prospect) – a park with play equipment, lawn and trees.
 Please note the club tennis courts are not accessible to the public.

TREE STRATEGY BRANCHES OUT



Attractive tree-lined streets with beautiful leafy canopies are a well-known feature of City of Prospect.

Our iconic green tunnels (streets lined with trees where their canopies grow to touch across the street) are fundamental to creating a sense of place and increasing health and wellbeing across our city.

Ensuring we protect and enhance City of Prospect's leafy character for future generations, council has developed a Tree Strategy. Specifically, the Tree Strategy explains how, over the next five years, City of Prospect can create an improved framework for managing our trees as assets. As part of the Tree Strategy, we will prioritise the Green Tunnel Strategy.

The Green Tunnel Strategy is a commitment of \$9.4m over 30 years to ensure trees remain a strong part of our city's future. This strategy will prioritise areas of public land for planting,

to create more green tunnels and a cooler, liveable city.

The State Government's 30-Year Plan for Greater Adelaide (2017) outlines key directions to create a greener city through an increase in green cover by 20% across metropolitan Adelaide by 2045. Tree canopy cover is an important way of measuring the tree population. A single large tree can shade a larger area than several smaller ones, so percentage cover is a greater indication of tree cover than counting individual trees. For City of Prospect, an increase of 20% on the 2018 canopy baseline measure of 20.4% will provide a council-wide canopy target of 24.5% by 2045.

Another important part of the strategy involves engaging with our community to plant trees on private land and protect established ones. As more than 75% of City of Prospect's land is owned by private landholders and other agencies, we cannot meet the State

Government's target to increase canopy cover by focusing on council land alone. The more trees, the better!

Prospect's Tree Strategy also captures current issues, challenges and opportunities while maintaining and protecting our existing trees. Increasing tree canopy cover through planting green tunnels will address the impacts of the challenges presented in this strategy through increasing biodiversity, cleaning the air and capturing carbon dioxide, reducing the heat island effect, protecting infrastructure assets, managing stormwater, providing shade, improving health and wellbeing, and cooling our city.

The intention is for the strategy to be reviewed every five years to meet changing priorities and incorporate new technologies and innovation.

Significant tree grants

Did you know council can help cover costs of works undertaken on listed Significant Trees? Last year's 12 applicants did!

The Significant Tree Grant Program is a collaborative program between council and community to restore and conserve large trees on private properties. Council will refund 50% of the cost of restoration, conservation or maintenance work undertaken on listed Significant Trees, up to a maximum of \$1,000 per property.

Priority is given to activities that have a positive impact of the tree's health, protect or enhance local biodiversity and trees that have not previously received grant funding.

The killing, removal, or destruction (e.g., tree damaging activity) of a significant tree will not be eligible for funding.

Heritage grants

Considering restoring the verandah or repairing salt damp on your heritage home?

Owners of heritage listed properties and/or properties within the Historic Area Overlay can apply for a council Heritage Grant.

Successful applicants can have 50% of the costs of conservation or restoration works (up to a maximum of \$2,000 per property) refunded by council.

Priority is given to recently designated Heritage Places, buildings that make a prominent contribution to the streetscape, projects which support the building's significant heritage elements and building that have not previously received grant funding.



FROM PROSPECT TO PRISONER OF WAR: VIVIAN BULLWINKEL'S INCREDIBLE TALE OF SURVIVAL



ANZAC Day provides us with a time to reflect and commemorate those who served and died in wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations. However, women are often forgotten.

This year, we're paying tribute to a Prospect woman who showed incredible courage, perseverance, and determination - Lieutenant Colonel Vivian Bullwinkel.

Vivian Bullwinkel was born in Kapunda on December 18, 1915. Her connection to Prospect is thanks to her grandparents, John and Eliza Shegog, who Vivian lived with at 7 Airlie Avenue, Prospect, between the ages of 9 and 13. She attended Prospect Public School, before being reunited with her parents in Broken Hill and attending Broken Hill High School.

Vivian began her training in nursing and midwifery at the Broken Hill and District Hospital in 1934, before moving to Kia Ora Hospital in Victoria, followed by Jessie McPherson Hospital in Melbourne.

Wanting to assist the Australian WWII effort, Vivian enlisted in the Australian Army Nursing Service as soon as she turned 25 and was assigned to the 2/13th Australian General Hospital in Singapore. She served with the 2/10th General Hospital unit until she re-joined the 2/13th General Hospital in Johor Baharu.

When the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbour in December 1941, everything changed for the Allies stationed throughout the Pacific, which was fast coming under the control of the Japanese.

To evade the advance, 65 Australian nurses, including Sister Bullwinkel, were evacuated on the SS Vyner Brooke on Friday, 13 February. The date lived up to its ominous persona, as the ship was sunk the following day by Japanese aircraft off Bangka Island. Around 150 survivors, including 22 nurses, managed to reach Radji Beach on Banka Island in Indonesia after swimming for up to 65 hours.

Within days, the Japanese sent a patrol of 16 men to Radji Beach, who took no prisoners. At bayonet point, the nurses were forced to walk into the water, and were then machinegunned in the back. Sister Bullwinkel, however, was a bit taller than average, which is believed to have saved her from the bullet's aim. She fell forward into the water and was presumed dead by the Japanese.

As told to *The Age* newspaper in 1945, Vivian's own account of the subsequent hours offers a harrowing glimpse into how bearing witness to the murder of her colleagues impacted her spirit.

"(I found) I was on the beach. Bodies of men and women were lying around me. The Japanese bayoneted the men's bodies, but left the women's alone. That is the only reason I am alive today. I lay still, partly because something told me I would be killed if I moved and partly because I did not care, anyway."

Rallying her remaining strength, Vivian dragged herself into the jungle where she hid for 12 days before eventually making it to a town where she surrendered to the Japanese. She was taken as a prisoner of war and was reunited with other surviving nurses from the SS Vyner Brooke. To avoid certain death, Vivian hid all evidence of her knowledge of the Radji Beach massacre, including her wound and the hole in her uniform made by the bullet.

Held as prisoner for three and a half years, Vivian saw many of her colleagues die from tropical diseases and malnutrition. Vivian herself saw her weight plummet, standing at 170cm tall and weighing only 32 kilos. When the Japanese surrendered, they sent the Australian nurses to Singapore, hoping they'd gain weight prior to returning to Australia to avoid negative repercussions for Japanese

prisoners. Vivian finally returned home to Australia in 1945.

Fuelled by her determination to seek justice for the men and women she saw brutally murdered, Vivian returned to Japan to give evidence at the Tokyo War Crimes Tribunal in 1947 (pictured below). Her testimony saw the Japanese sergeant charged and serve 12 years imprisonment for his part in the killings.




Vivian also climbed the military ranks, reaching captain, and later retired from service in the Citizens Military Force in 1970 as a lieutenant-colonel. She then served as the Director of Nursing at Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital until 1977 as President of the Royal College of Nursing. Lieutenant Colonel Bullwinkel was also awarded the Florence Nightingale Medal, the MBE, and Order of Australia, and was appointed the first woman trustee of the Australian War Memorial in Canberra. The much honoured, selfless, and trailblazing Vivian Statham (nee Bullwinkel) AO MBE died on July 3, 2000. In December 2022, the Australian College of Nursing, together with the Australian War Memorial, announced the upcoming installation of a life-size sculpture of Vivian. The sculpture will be the first of an individual nurse or woman within the Memorial's grounds, a fitting tribute to her exceptional military service and importance to the



development of Australian nursing.

THE HISTORY OF THE PROSPECT FAMILY HISTORY GROUP



Was interested in stories about my family from my teens and collected old paperwork and family photos when no one else was really interested", Lesley Attema said when asked what made her want to get involved with the Prospect Family History Group.

Researching family history was far more difficult when the Prospect Family History Group started 18 years ago. In the early 2000s, the internet was still a mystery to many, and contained far less information. Library volunteer Jenni Cotton sought to help those interested in their own family history begin their research journey, and so the Prospect Family History Group was born.

City of Prospect helped the group get started with a \$700 grant, used to purchase specialised research materials, including the South Australian Births, Deaths and Marriages Marriage and Death CDs published by Genealogy SA.

Lesley became involved after being persuaded by Jenni to take her interest in family history to the next level.

"Jenni taught me a lot and I found I really enjoyed doing the research and helping others start their family stories", Lesley said.

Once a month, the Prospect Family History Group met to help people research their family history. Enquiries steadily grew in the mid to late 2000s. Lesley said the passing of elderly relatives often piques a family's curiosity.

"The TV show Who Do You Think You Are? made a big impact too, and increased members of the group", Lesley said.

Along with providing research assistance, the group also organised tours to the State Records of South Australia Research Centre at Gepps Cross, the Latter-day Saints Library, North Road and West Terrace cemeteries and the Mortlock Wing of the State Library of South Australia.

In 2015, founder Jenni Cotton passed away, but the group continued with Margaret Davey joining Lesley in running the monthly meetings and assisting with research. Lesley credits Margaret with the group continuing, and says Margaret was particularly good at tracking down information from overseas and understanding modern DNA research.

After nearly two decades researching family history, Lesley can't pick a favourite historical story she has helped to be rediscovered.

"It's impossible to pick one! Every enquiry to the library finds something interesting and often valuable Prospect local history material is discovered along the way," Lesley said.

"The latest enquiry found material about an early Prospect policeman who served at a police station near the corner of Prospect Road and Pulsford Avenue around 1900. The police items in the Prospect collection (on display on level 1 in the library) are now believed to have been donated by one of his descendants."

Group numbers declined in recent years, with the pandemic bringing monthly meetings to a halt. Lesley adds that the rise of the internet made it much easier for people to start their own research journey. The Prospect Family History Group officially ceased in 2022. While the Prospect Family History Group may be history itself, Lesley is confident local families will still find old photos and want to know more about their ancestry and genealogy.

"People can still ask for help at Prospect Library, even though the 'official' family history group no longer exists", she said.

She does have one warning, though.

"It's easy to get hooked!"

Lesley's tips for family history research:

- Start with what you know, then fill in the gaps.
- Don't automatically believe everything, but don't discount information too quickly - there may be a grain of truth which will make sense later.
- Visit Trove, an online collection from Australia's cultural, community and research institutions at trove.nla.gov.au.
- Prospect Library has a dedicated history computer and research material in the Local History room on the first floor of Payinthi (128 Prospect Road, Prospect).
- If you need help, contact the City of Prospect Local History Officer on 8269 5355 or the Prospect Local History Group.
