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# AN ANTIDOTE TO THE MUNDANE

With the belief that art created with spontaneity and instinct can create moments of purity, Adelaide-based artist Mark Niehus employs this well-practised approach to his cross-disciplinary process which spans painting, video, music, poetry and more.

Niehus is rarely seen these days; he is hunkered down in his studio churning out massive paintings on plywood, or arched over his editing suite producing a unique projection mural in readiness for his next exhibition, Backbone, at Newmarch Gallery from 9 April to 9 May 2021.

This growing body of work captures the experiences of individuals in diverse situations revealing the value and agency of human beings, individually and collectively to engineer action and be one's best self. How they fare will have to be seen through this collection of projection light, penned elucidations and blindly knowing markings on plywood and paper.

The bold colours, use of spontaneous line and markings, visual narratives, and intimate portrayal of his painted and projected figures, viewed alongside Niehus' poetic words, takes you further into a world that Niehus says is born of his subconscious mind that he employs to invent and transcend the mundane. His work is far from mundane, in fact it may well be a temporary antidote, so get down to the Newmarch Gallery and get your shot.

# PLANNING AWARDS FOR PROSPECT

The 2020 Planning Institute of Australia (PIA) Awards for Planning Excellence in South Australia was held in November 2020 and City of Prospect received three separate awards.

**Winner of the Improving Planning Processes and Practices category for Suburban Residential Character Assessment.**

The character of local areas is often a misunderstood and misused concept. Suburban Residential Character Assessment

was prepared by staff to provide an evidence based assessment tool to identify and categorise character areas within our residential streets. This work was supported by feedback from design experts, stakeholders and the community. The findings of our Study were able to positively influence City of Prospect's position with regard to the Planning and Design Code (the new planning criteria for South Australia) and also received positive buy-in from the local community.

**Winner of the Hard Won Victory category for the Transformation and Uplift of Churchill Road Precinct .**

The Churchill Road precinct has witnessed a twelve-year program involving a suite of actions (including a streetscape masterplan, re-zoning and follow-up design policy review and, open space re-developments) that has transformed an area suffering from heavy traffic, poor amenity, ageing infrastructure and outdated policy into an area catering for 650 new dwellings, 2000 new residents, increased mixed use developments, community facilities, public open space and streetscape upgrades.

**Commendation for the Great Place category for Payinithi.**

Payinithi is a community and civic development in the heart of City of Prospect that centralises Council's services and is a focus point for residents, visitors and staff. It is an exemplar of urban corridor design by combining the historic town hall with a contemporary multi-storey facility with main street activation. In essence the building combines our built form history and our progressive outlook for the local area.

Council is honoured to receive this recognition from the peak planning body for recent work undertaken to achieve our strategic directions for Prospect that balances the sensitive transformation of spaces whilst protecting areas and items valued by the local community.

## How do you want your community to be represented?

Have your voice in the composition of Council by being part of this year's Representation Review.

A Representation Review is a legislated process, mandated to occur every eight years, to determine whether a council would benefit from an alteration to its current composition or ward structure to meet its future requirements and that of the community.

As a community member you have an ability to participate and engage in the review process and provide your views as to how you may prefer Council to be structured in regards to Wards and Elected Members.

You will have two main opportunities to contribute. The first consultation in the Representation Review Process will be shortly underway and includes a survey to accompany the required Representation Options Paper. Please take the time to be involved.

It is important to have your say now so that your feedback is considered by Council when determining the preferred model.

The key areas for consideration are:

- Election or appointment of the Principal Member (Mayor/Chairperson);
- The number of councillors;

- How councillors are elected – from wards, across the whole of the Council area or a combination of both;
- Whether the Council should have wards or no wards; and
- The name of the Council and the wards (if any).

## HAPPY 101<sup>ST</sup> BIRTHDAY!

Yvonne Cassebohm's face lights up with joy as she recalls her childhood years spent exploring Prospect in the early 1930s, a time when dray horses and hay wagons moved their loads on Churchill Road and trams on Prospect Road were filled with passengers heading into the city.

Now a centenarian and approaching her 101st birthday in June this year, Yvonne needed her 'walker' to navigate her way to a recent meeting to discuss the support she is receiving from Council's Aged Care Program, Prospect Community Support.

A recent fall has made Yvonne unsteady on her feet and needing some more support to continue to live independently in her own home. Her sense of humour, sharp mind, friendly smile and sparkling eyes clearly express a life well-lived, and pride for her

supportive and loving family.

Born in June 1920, Yvonne vividly recalls her early school years working in her mother's deli and grocery shop, opening up the deli before school, making home deliveries of groceries in the neighbourhood and walking to and from Braund Road School, now Prospect Primary School. The shop that had been owned by Yvonne's mother Clarice Tisher, is now one of the family's favourite restaurants, the Rose Garden Thai Restaurant at the corner of Vine Street and Churchill Road.

Over these last ten decades Yvonne feels her biggest lessons in life were to be understanding and always sociable with others, to work hard, and strive to be resilient to life's challenges.

## Charles Cane Reserve / Parndo Yerta



A number of additions have been made to the oval surrounds, including an entry area around the existing artwork, fitness hub and playspace and family gathering area.

The playspace is very 'nature focused' with opportunities to interact with various plants and natural materials. The playspace includes a play deck with climbing ability, swing and slide equipment, a creek bed with adjacent sandpit, intimate lawned picnic areas, family

gathering spaces and barbecue facilities.

The fitness hub provides a variety of fitness equipment, both moveable and static, with ample opportunities to sit and rest as well as exercise.

The existing sculpture, Time and Space by George Andric (2012), has stayed in its original location at the north-east corner and has been accentuated with gardens beds of various plant species and a welcoming entry space.

# PROSPECT GARDENS / NARNU WIRRA PLAYSACE UPGRADE



In late 2020, two rounds of community consultation were completed on the proposed upgrade for the eastern side of Prospect Gardens / Narnu Wirra, located on East Terrace in Nailsworth. It was confirmed that the park is very popular, that the community is very passionate about the space, and that they take pride in its appearance and functionalities.

As Council prepares to deliver the revised concept plan, the playspace will require a short closure period during construction, which will occur during autumn/winter.

We thank you for your patience and look forward to re-opening in mid-2021.

While Prospect Gardens / Narnu Wirra is closed, there are other local spaces that can be visited during this time including:

- Broadview Oval/ Yarnta Tutu yarta playspace and dog park \*newly-constructed\* (McInnes Avenue, Broadview)
- Peppermint Gums Reserve (corner of Dean Street and Barker Road, Prospect)
- Memorial Gardens (Menzie's Crescent, Prospect)

This project will be delivered in partnership with the State Government through the *Open Space and Places for People* grant funding and we thank the State Government for their contribution to enhancing this fantastic space.

## Broadview Oval /Yarnta Tutu yarta

The playspace and dog park are located off McInnes Avenue in Broadview.

The playspace features a range of inclusive and challenging play equipment including a sandpit, dry creek bed, picnic areas, interactive artworks and attractive garden beds throughout.

The dog park design incorporates a great lawn space, interactive features for dog exercise and a new garden bed which runs along the

tennis court fencing.

Improved lighting will increase safety and ensure better use of the space as it gets dark, particularly during the winter.

We are excited about these new additions and how they complement other recent upgrades around the oval, including the running track, fitness hub, dirt bike track and tennis courts improvements.



## Our reconciliation journey

City of Prospect remains committed to the ongoing journey of reconciliation and healing with the local and broader Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. To further realise this journey, Council has committed to take the necessary steps to progress to a treaty (however described) with the Kurna people.

'Makarrata', a Yolngu word, has long been proposed as an alternative name for the treaty process in Australia. The Makarrata journey means truly listening; finding shared understandings, shared connections and conversations; and fostering relationships based on a new level of empathy created.

Council now invites expressions of interest to join a Working Group which will meet as part of the plan to deliver a Makarrata outcome in City of Prospect. Alongside Elected Members and our CEO, we would welcome nominations to the group from our Aboriginal and Torres Strait

Islander residents and community, in addition to those with expertise or a genuine passion and belief in this area, to champion and lead the process. This could include, but not be limited to, those with skills and community experience in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health and / or policy field.

It is envisaged that 'truth telling' forums will be hosted at the appropriate stage between Kurna people and the broader local community.

We invite those who feel that they would make an important contribution to contact Council, through the Office of the CEO, to discuss your interest to become involved as a volunteer within this Working Group. ## LOST DOGS – KEEPING YOUR DOG SAFE

As dogs are an important addition to many families, losing your dog can be a distressing time for both the dog owner and the dog. There are many reasons why dogs may escape from their yards including gates being left open or not properly secured, poorly maintained or inadequate fencing, dogs escaping from under the roller door or being spooked by loud noises such as thunderstorms or fireworks.

Ensuring that fencing and other containment measures are secure enough to keep your dog safely confined to the property can help to avoid your dog from escaping. However, if you do happen to lose your dog, we recommend you contact us as soon as possible to report your dog is missing and leave an exact description of your dog, together with your contact details.

We also recommend that local veterinary clinics, the Animal Welfare League, RSPCA and neighbouring councils are contacted as your dog may have been collected and taken to a vet or shelter.

It is also advisable to keep your contact details and your dog's microchip and registration details up to date in DACO (Dogs and Cats Online) as this helps to reunite dogs with their owners as quickly as possible.

Dogs found to be wandering alone in a public or private place are considered to be wandering at large which is an offence under the Dog and Cat Management Act 1995, so avoid the fine and keep your dog safely contained within your property.

### What do I do if I find a lost dog?

If you find a lost dog wandering please secure it (only if safe to do so) then call Council on **8269 5355** (day or night) so an Animal Management Officer can attend. The dog will be collected from you as soon as possible and in many instances the dog's owners may already have notified Council that the dog is missing.

Our officers aim to reunite dogs with their owners as soon as possible to avoid any unnecessary stress for the dog or its family. However, when the owner can't be located or if the dog has no identification they are impounded at the Animal Welfare League at Edinburgh North.

## Scoop the Poop

Council has recently installed footpath decals around the City in locations close to dog poo bag dispensers. Scanning the QR code on the decal will take you to a map of all dog poo bag dispensers around the City, so dog owners can design their walking routes and collect spare bags along the way, ensuring they always have a spare bag on hand to clean up after their dog.



## Barking Mad

The occasional bark is normal dog behaviour however, when barking becomes excessive it often becomes unacceptable and unpleasant for owners and surrounding neighbours.

There are several reasons why a dog may bark excessively, including boredom or frustration, being left alone, physical discomfort or pain, attention seeking or reacting to external stimulus.

Barking may need to be controlled if it continues for extended periods of time, occurs too frequently or occurs at inappropriate times of the day or night. Some possible solutions include ensuring your dog has adequate exercise and stimulation such

as hunting for hidden food, playing games with you or other dogs or playing with toys.

Sometimes, dog owners don't know their dog is barking excessively or where to get help. The RSPCA (SA) offers their own Dog Training courses, and have produced a list of professional dog trainers, as well as 'force-free dog trainers', who can help dog owners modify their dog's behaviour through training. # WHAT CAN YOU DO WITH ALL THE LEAVES THAT AUTUMN LEAVES?



## Compost Them

Gardening expert Graham 'Willow' Williams told ABC Radio that, "autumn leaves are gold in the garden". He recommends turning them into a leaf mould (semi-decomposed leaf matter) by making a pile, adding some water, covering them, then turning them over every few weeks. In three months or so you'll have a nutrient-rich organic semi-decomposed leaf mould to put on the garden.

## Great for your home compost bin or worm farm

Dry leaf matter provides a great source of carbon in your compost bin or worm farm. Use leaves to layer between wet food scraps and garden materials.

## Make a mulch

Leaf matter provides nutrients, helps to stop weeds, and to retain moisture in the soil. Rake them up and spread them straight on or mulch them up first and put them in flower beds, vegetable gardens and under trees and shrubs or in container.

## Mow over them

One of the easiest solutions is to run over them with the lawn mower, no raking required. Empty the lawn mower catcher onto your garden for mulch, or directly into your compost bin or green lidded food or garden organics (FOGO) bin.

## Rake them up

Place them onto your garden for mulch, into your compost bin or directly into your green lidded food or garden organics (FOGO) bin.

## Please don't bag or rake leaves onto the street

Please don't place leaves, lawn clippings or other garden material in a plastic bag. Plastic bags are not compostable and will cause contamination issues.

During autumn, Council's street sweeping program is under pressure due to the increased leaf fall, so services are aligned specifically to the street tree species, and concentrate on the areas of highest demand. This means we can't always quickly attend to other streets or locations, so raking or blowing leaves into the street isn't encouraged.

## Worm farm and compost bin incentive scheme

Approximately 35% of all domestic waste found in our landfill bins is food and garden waste. When this organic material is buried in landfill, it breaks down in an anaerobic environment (without oxygen) producing harmful greenhouse gases, including methane.

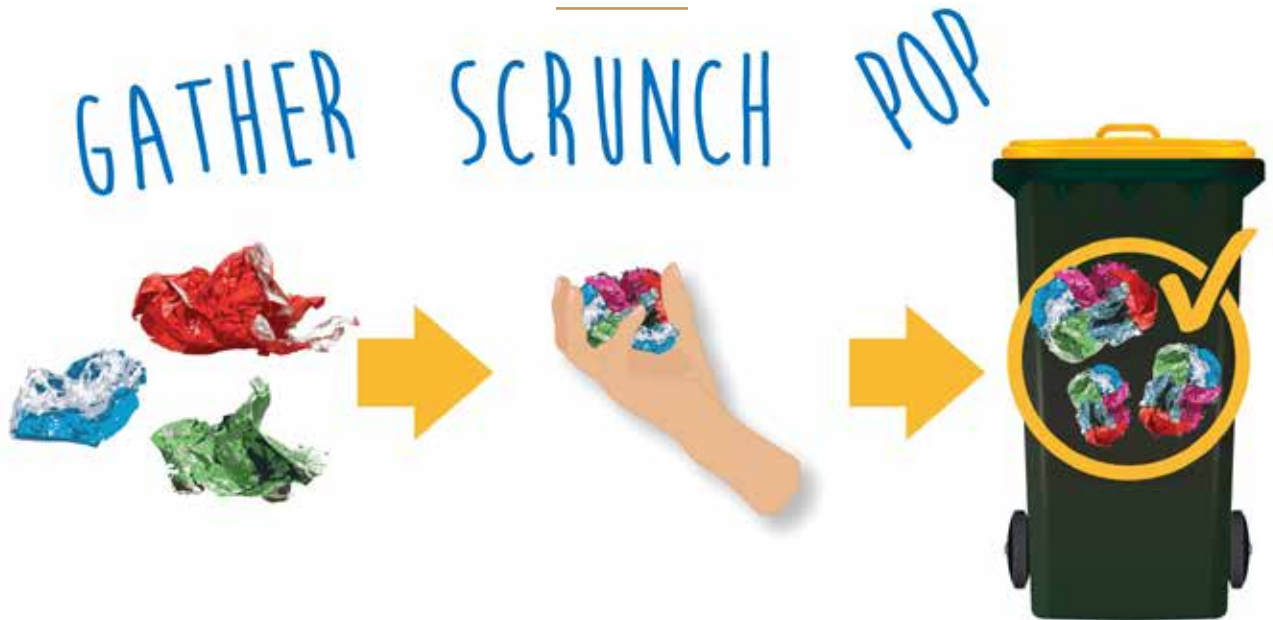
Home composting and worm farming are excellent ways to reduce the amount of organic waste sent to landfill, while at the same time turning this valuable organic material into nutrient-rich soil and liquid fertilisers. When these fertilisers are applied to our gardens it helps to improve the soil condition, leading to healthier plants while increasing the soil's water-holding capacity.

Council offers financial incentives to residents who purchase a composting system or worm farm, to encourage and recognise their efforts to reduce waste to landfill. # EGGSELLENT WAYS TO REDUCE YOUR WASTE THIS EASTER!



Although the aluminium foil and plastic wrappers on Easter eggs may look pretty, it's not so pretty when it comes to the impact it has on our environment through the energy and resources required to produce it. Also, most of it still ends up in landfill. So, let's avoid, reduce and recycle the foil and plastic packaging this Easter.

#### Avoid and reduce:

- Pick the eggs with the least packaging.
- Avoid or reduce the number of small individually wrapped eggs that you purchase.
- Make your own chocolate eggs in moulds.
- Bake your own hot cross buns and avoid the plastic bags they are packaged in. Or, purchase hot cross buns from a bakery and ask for them to be placed in a paper bag that can be recycled easily.
- Avoid plastic wrapped, pre-packaged Easter baskets. Create your own gift basket with homemade chocolates or baked goodies instead.

#### Re-use:

- Re-use foil wrappers to make decorations and paintings.
- Re-use gift boxes, strawberry or tomato punnets to package eggs or other gifts.
- Re-use moulded plastic packaging for making your own chocolate eggs.

#### Recycle:

- Recycling aluminium saves 95% of the energy required to produce it from raw materials. Scrunch up your aluminium foil wrappers into the size of a small fist or medium size Easter egg, then pop them in the recycling bin. Alternatively you can place smaller pieces into an aluminium drink can to contain them before placing it in the recycle bin.
- Recycle the soft plastic bags that come with your hot cross buns in the REDcycle and soft plastic recycling bins found at your local supermarket.
- Recycle the rigid moulded plastic containers along with the cardboard boxes and Easter cards in the recycling bin.

Prospect Community Support and Adelaide Aquatic Centre have partnered to develop a fun, 45 minute, shallow water aqua aerobics class suitable for both beginners and the more advanced.

"The buoyancy of the water is easy on your joints, which makes water aerobics a good choice if you have joint problems, chronic

pain, or are recovering from injury," said one of Council's Community Programs Officers.

"Keeping fit and active is a priority for many of our older residents. Council already offers regular exercise classes within both Payinthe and Nailsworth Hall, so this new activity will make good use of the nearby Aquatic Centre".

## Making your home more sustainable can be simple

Try one or two of these low-cost tips to get started:

- Put fruit and veggie scraps in your green bin.
- Set your air conditioner's thermostat to 24-27°C or as high as you can while feeling comfortable. Every degree you lower your thermostat can increase your cooling costs by up to 10%.
- Fit a low-flow showerhead to reduce the water used while showering.
- Use cold water to wash your clothes, potentially saving 90 per cent of your machine's energy use that would otherwise be directed to heating the water.
- Flick the switch off when you're not using electrical appliances. Gadgets left on standby, even smaller items like phone chargers, are energy suckers and can add up to 10 per cent to your electricity bill.

Prospect Library also has Home Energy Toolkits available to borrow. The toolkits contain easy-to-use devices to help you find out how energy is being used in your home, and what you can do to generate savings.

"My focus is about all forms of sustainability – adapting, reusing, recycling and energy efficiency –"

"There are always competing demands when it comes to sustainability; I do support density to protect our urban fringes but I also support good design, preserving heritage and quality open space." Alison acknowledges that increased density and activity comes with issues around on-street parking and maintaining green cover on private land.

Reducing household waste is also one of the biggest challenges for communities and councils, and Alison has been a firm supporter of motions to reduce waste going to landfill.

Cr de Backer doesn't just focus on sustainability in her work and as a Councillor, but also lives a sustainable life at home.

"Personally, most of my furniture is second hand and I love recycled fashion," said Cr de Backer.

"I have been interested in heritage since I moved to Prospect and bought an old church. From there I joined the Prospect Local History Group and it sparked my interest in Council."

Alison lives in Prospect with her husband Michael and her fur-baby, Darcy the dog.



## A lifetime connection to Prospect



North Ward Councillor Robin Pearce has many stories about Prospect and how it has changed over the years. He has lots of first-hand knowledge too, as he has lived here his entire life!

"I was born in Prospect and remember the first Council Chambers at the back of where the current building is. Kids used to congregate there and play sport," said Cr Pearce.

"Back in the day Prospect had a real community feel and there were no cafes, restaurants or a wine bar!"

Cr Pearce has clear memories of Prospect Road, and the different shops that have inhabited the strip over time.

"There used to be a picture theatre where the current Foodland is and the only supermarket was a small one on the corner of Kintore Avenue," said Cr Pearce.

"Leo's was the first pizza bar in the area, but before that there were no places to eat out."

Cr Pearce raised his two children in Prospect, and now is actively involved in the lives of his four grandsons. His daughter is also a Councillor at the City of Charles Sturt.

"I think the best part of Prospect is the community feel. It's changed a bit in my time here but it still has that same feel," said Cr Pearce.



## GROWING LOCAL IN PROSPECT

**A**t Prospect Community Garden (PCG) we grow food and share gardening skills and knowledge. PCG is a shared garden, so the group does not hire out individual plots. Gardeners work together to grow vegetables, herbs, fruit and flowers organically and share the produce. Each week there are a variety of tasks to suit a range of interests and abilities; seed-saving, propagating, harvesting and pruning, depending on the season. There is a children's area with a cubby, sandpit and kid-sized gardening tools. There is also a resident blue-tongue lizard family! Last year was tough for community groups; PCG was closed for a few months and the local fruit fly outbreak meant the monthly fruit and vegetable swap went into recess. In 2021 the group will be promoting growing local in Prospect, with workshops and opportunities to learn about, and

grow, some local native plants for your home garden.

They hope the Fruit and Veg swap can re-start in May. Locals bring along garden produce, seeds, flowers, preserves and plants to share with others. It's a great way to meet community members and swap gardening stories. You can also bring a book to swap at their street library!

New gardeners are always welcome at PCG. They would love to hear from you if you have ideas for workshops, or gardening skills to share.

PCG is open from 9am to 12pm on Tuesdays and Saturdays, and is located on the western side of Memorial Gardens (near the tennis courts on Willcox Avenue).

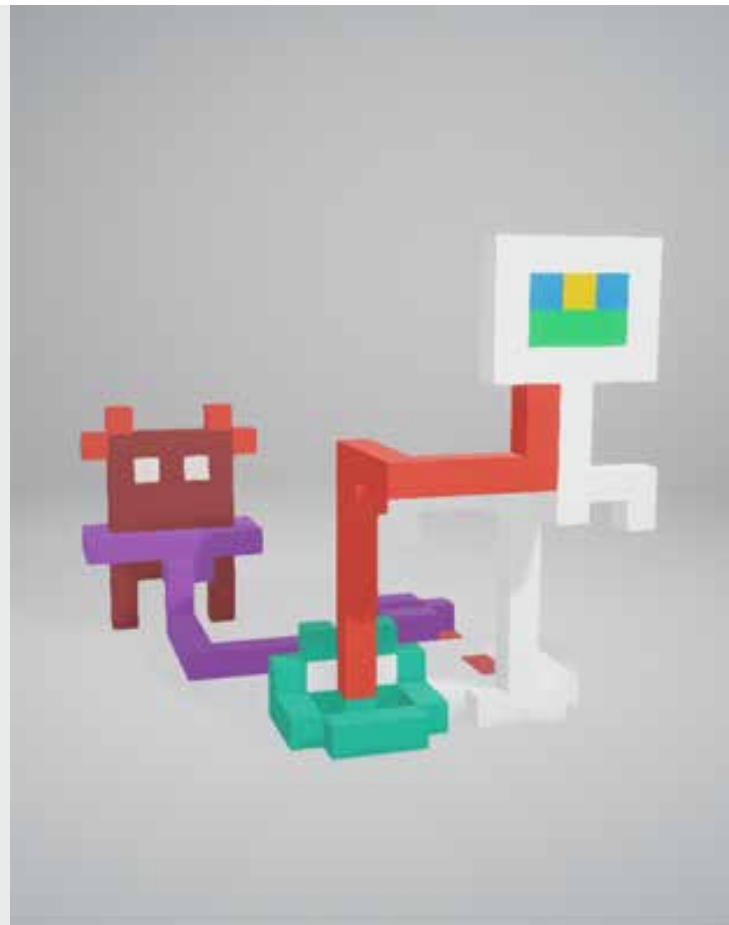

## Celebrating our past

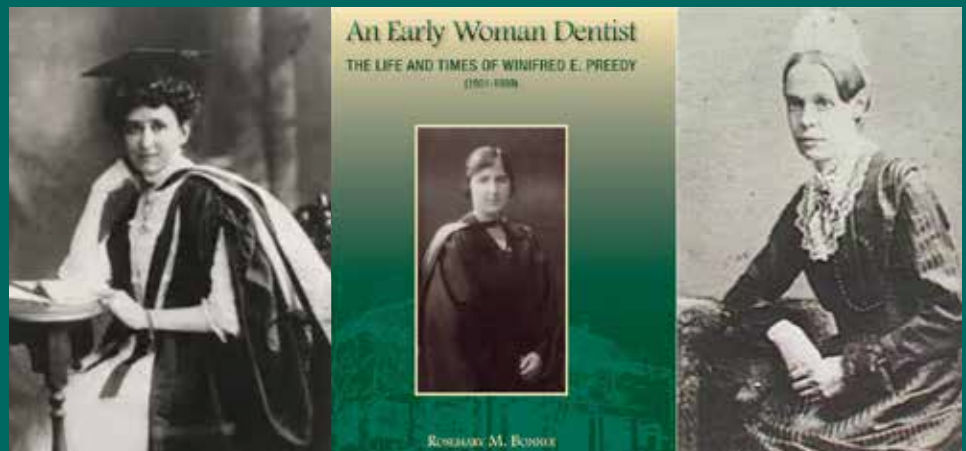
The group is looking forward to resuming the annual SA History Festival this May, after last year's disruption.

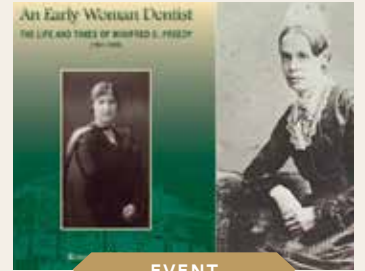

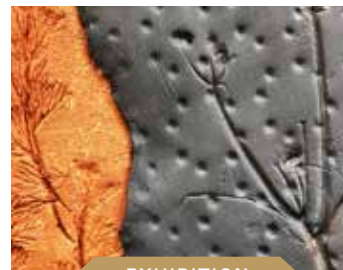
