Award for saving historic tree

The rescue of an historic carob tree in St Helens Park has led to City of Prospect being recognised with an award.

Mayor David O'Loughlin accepted the Local Government Association of South Australia's Major Risk Award for saving the beloved tree in St Helens Park. This Award represents the Council's careful management of the tree, which had become a concern to Council staff in its old age.

After a thorough health assessment, it was decided the tree was in reasonable condition but required a careful approach to keep it safe and healthy. This included strategic pruning, regular removal of damaged branches, and installing bespoke bracing poles to support its weight. Signage has also been installed detailing Council's journey to save the tree.

Thanks to the City of Prospect staff involved, and we hope visitors to St Helens Park enjoy seeing the beautiful old tree.

CHURCHILL ROAD'S NEW LOOK IS COMPLETE

Stage Three of the Churchill Road Streetscape Upgrade is now complete. With Stage One having commenced back in 2010, it's been a long road, but we have now upgraded all of Churchill Road within City of Prospect. This is an achievement we are very proud of and the project has transformed the look and feel of a busy arterial road within our network. The final stage was a challenging upgrade, working around major existing services whilst managing varying access requirements between local residents and businesses.

NEW 40KM/H SPEED LIMIT

After four community surveys over 12 years confirmed majority support, the Department of Infrastructure and Transport has approved our request for a 40km/h speed limit for City of Prospect. This covers our entire City, with the City of Port Adelaide Enfield agreeing to extend the speed limit throughout the sections of Broadview and Sefton Park south of Regency Road.

"This is one of the key road safety treatments pursued by the majority of locals to improve safety, reduce noise and lower traffic impacts by encouraging cross-city travellers to remain on main roads," Mayor David O'Loughlin said.

"We know it has worked well west of Prospect Road for many years and we hope it will bring similar success to the east of our City."

While there may be a perception that lowering speed limits will impact local travel times, research into the impact of lower speeds in urban areas has identified that it actually has minimal impacts on travel times, with driving delays mostly occurring at intersections and due to other unrelated matters.

Partnering with the City of Port Adelaide Enfield for the rollout in adjoining areas has also resulted in overall cost savings.

Keep safe and avoid fines with help from new parking guide

To help motorists understand and comply with the relevant Australian Road Rules around car parking, City of Prospect has created an easy to read brochure, A Guide to Parking in City of Prospect.

The guide includes all the information you need to ensure you do not draw the attention of Council's parking inspectors, who regularly patrol local roads for vehicles breaching the road rules.

SUPPORT FOR YOUTH TO HIT NEW HEIGHTS



Layla Balestrin has always been competitive and has worked tirelessly to find her niche in the world of competitive diving.

Earlier this year, Layla qualified to represent South Australia at the 2021 Australian Age Diving Championships held at Brisbane Aquatic Centre in April. Layla competed in the 12-13 year old one-metre Springboard event.

The national championships are very competitive and usually dominated by the eastern states. These states generally have squads two or three times larger than the SA team, which only had 13 members this year.

Layla represented her state well, finishing in eighth position out of 19 competitors. Along the way, Layla scored a personal best overall total.

The costs involved with transport, accommodation, meals and uniforms are significant, so when the Balestrin family discovered the Youth Sponsorship Program offered by City of Prospect, they jumped at the opportunity to apply for financial assistance.

Layla said she is extremely grateful for financial support provided by Council, and believes it's a great program that more young people should be aware of.

The Youth Sponsorship program aims to encourage and support local young people aged 21 years and under who have been selected to represent their institution, club or organisation in areas including sport and recreation, science, technology, arts and culture. The maximum entitlement for events and activities held locally is \$75 or \$250 for interstate.

Do you have an Advance Care Directive?

An Advance Care Directive is an important step forward in planning your future health care needs.

An Advance Care Directive allows you to:

- Write down your wishes, preferences and instructions for your future health care, living arrangements, personal matters and end of life care.
- Appoint one or more substitute decision-makers to make these decisions on your behalf, if you are unable to make them for yourself.

It may give you peace of mind that those caring for you will know what you want

when you are unable to make your own decisions or communicate your wishes and values. This can happen at any stage of life and could be for a number of reasons including:

- an accident or mental health episode
- dementia or a similar condition such as a brain injury
- a sudden or serious stroke, or
- you are unconscious or in a coma.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

It's terrific when governments work together. Two exciting projects in our City are the already popular play and fitness spaces at Charles Cane Reserve and the Prospect Gardens upgrade under way in Nailsworth. Neither would have been possible without the 50 per cent of funds coming from the State Government, which collect a fee of \$7,000 for every apartment developed on our main roads. The State Government also funded half of the third and final stage of our Churchill Road beautification, and is working with us to

develop the former Kaufland site.

Federally, we have received more than \$1.2m towards the long-awaited upgrade of Devonport Terrace, now under way following the completion of the rail electrification works in our area.

For the 21/22 financial year, we have secured a \$1.5m State Government Grassroots grant for the Council's \$4m Broadview Oval Community and Sports Hub project, 50 per cent of the funding for the Livingstone Ave Road and Drainage Upgrade, and \$3m towards the \$4.5m Churchill Road Drainage Upgrade to help alleviate local flooding.

These are all substantial wins and help us deliver much-needed projects we simply could not afford to deliver on our own. Please join me in thanking our local members when you see them.

We are also incredibly appreciative of a private donation of \$40,000 to help extend our loved but cramped Men's Shed; an example of outstanding and unexpected goodwill and generosity from someone who really believes in the value of togetherness. This commitment – from a member of our community who has asked for anonymity – will see an expansion of services to cater for a wider audience, including work benches with wheelchair access, turning this site into a truly inclusive, safe and welcoming space.

We are passionate about our local heritage. Not content with a recent State Government knockback, Council has resolved to ask the State Government to amend its code to ensure each Historic Area Overlay (Zone) in City of Prospect contains a sufficient number of listed 'Representative Buildings' to define its character. We have also requested additional listings and more Historic Area Overlays in our City's east. I hope you've seen our recent signposting of Historic Areas in the city and the steady roll-out of heritage plaques on Local Heritage properties.

Sadly our CEO Nigel McBride left us mid-year, and I thank him for his leadership, contributions and support over nearly two years. Nigel started on the day Payinthe opened, and soon after had to manage and navigate the onslaught of COVID-19 and its impact on our team and services. His strong direction throughout the pandemic resulted in our team providing different types of assistance to our residents and businesses, including the much lauded and sector-leading meal voucher program and rate relief package. Most welcome was Nigel's business background, providing new energy and applying a fresh lens over our business attraction and economic development endeavours while also ensuring that Council enacted a new detailed Community Plan – a legacy he should be rightly proud of. Exploring a Treaty with Kaurna people

Building on the achievements of Council's Reconciliation Action Plan and support for the 2017 Uluru Statement from the Heart, Mayor David O'Loughlin and former CEO Nigel McBride – prior to his departure – met with senior Kaurna Elders and representatives from Kaurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation.

A focus of the discussion was the decision at Council's September 2020 meeting, to develop a Treaty with Kaurna people. Details of Council's commitment are as follows:

(1) City of Prospect recognises the significant contribution to culture from our ancient history and our important connections to Kaurna people. After recently adopting the Uluru Statement of the Heart and displaying it in

our Kaurna-named Payinthe building, Council now calls for a report to be prepared which investigates the options and the process for progressing a Treaty (or similar agreement) with Kaurna people.

(2) As an integral part of City of Prospect undertaking a process of agreement making with the Kaurna peoples, Council make available and promote the use of Payinthe to host 'truth-telling' forums between Kaurna peoples, locals and other interested parties.

What is the Uluru Statement?

The Uluru Statement from the Heart was a national Indigenous consensus position on Indigenous constitutional recognition, which came out of a constitutional convention of 250

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander delegates. Held at the foot of Uluru in Central Australia on the lands of the Anangu people, the statement called for the establishment of a 'First Nations Voice' enshrined in the Australian Constitution and the establishment of a 'Makarrata Commission' to supervise agreement-making and truth-telling between governments and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

ELLIE SUPPORTS BRAIN CANCER RESEARCH

A nine-year-old Nailsworth girl has cut off her long hair to raise funds for brain cancer research.

Nailsworth Primary School student Ellie Searson was inspired by fellow Nailsworth resident, Sophie Harris, who lives with an inoperable brain stem tumour. Sophie dedicates herself to raising money for Cure for Brain Cancer and the yearly Walk 4 Brain Cancer event.

Sophie is a very familiar face around City of Prospect, as a volunteer at Prospect Library and as the Young Citizen of the Year recipient in 2016.

Originally, Ellie set out to raise \$100 but far exceeded that, raising \$1,000 for brain cancer research late last year. Part of Ellie's fundraising and awareness campaign included a presentation at school to her fellow students.

"I was very inspired by Sophie's efforts so last year

I decided to do my own fundraiser," said Ellie.

"First, I grew my hair as long as I could. It was very long.

"Next, my mum helped me set up a GoFundMe Campaign. Then, I invited people to sponsor me. I wanted to raise \$100 for Sophie's campaign. In the end, many people in our community were very generous and I ended up raising \$1000.00 in total.

"The reason I grew my hair so long is so I could donate it to be used to make a wig for a sick child who has lost their hair."

"Our whole family are blown away by the amazing support of our friends and family," said Ellie's mum, Kate.

"Ellie is so proud to be able to make such a significant contribution to Sophie's campaign. Here's hoping all these generous gifts can help to halt the devastation of brain cancer."

We asked recent-winner Jasmine Crisp about her experience in the Prospect Portrait Prize.

"I'd returned home to Adelaide in 2019 after over four months of international residencies. The painting I entered into the 10th Prospect Portrait Prize was the most personal and meaningful work that I produced during that experience. Winning the first prize was incredibly motivating and filled me with home grown support at a time when I was forming new goals and objectives in the arts. This led me to want to build a stronger foundation locally and drove me to continue in making a new ambitious series of highly personal works related to home (Adelaide).

Did you know that all cats in South Australia must be desexed and microchipped, with these details entered into the centralised Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) registration database?

Apart from it being the law, microchipping and registration is the best way for cat owners to safeguard their furry friends as all councils, the RSPCA, Animal Welfare League and most vets use DACO. There is no fee, and registration means that any cat found wandering can be scanned, identified and returned to its owner as quickly as possible. Unregistered cats, however, run the risk of being lost forever if they can't be identified.

A way to honour their sacrifice



A series of memorial plaques have been installed on the bollards surrounding Prospect's Memorial Gardens. The plaques honour the sacrifice made by many of our local people who served Australia during World War I (WWI).

The Prospect Local History Group initiated the project and were successful in securing grant funding through the Commonwealth of Australia's Saluting Their Services Commemorative Grants Program. The grants program is designed to preserve Australia's wartime heritage and highlight the service and sacrifice of Australia's servicemen and women in wars, conflicts and peace operations, and promote appreciation and understanding of the role that those who served have played in shaping the nation.

Located on Menzies Crescent, Prospect, the Memorial Gardens were opened officially in 1936 by Governor Sir Winston Dugan, who dedicated them to the memory of Prospect residents who had served during WWI. There is a plaque located near the Memorial Arch commemorating the opening by the Governor.

Neil Rossiter from the Prospect Local History Group said, "The plaques provide a natural link between other memorials located throughout the gardens".

"Take a short stroll along Wilcox Avenue to Prospect Oval/Payinthe Yarta and in the grounds of the Prospect Air Raid Communications Centre you'll find further honour boards commemorating those who died during service in World War II (WWII)," Neil said.

From time to time, the Prospect Local History Group run small group tours. Tours are promoted on their website and Facebook page as well as on the History Trust of SA's website during History Month, held annually in May.

Heritage Matters



To highlight and preserve the City of Prospect's built history, which adds so much to the flavour and character of the City, we have implemented various initiatives, including the Heritage Grant Program, Heritage Plaque Installation Program and Heritage Street Sign Program.

The Heritage Grant Program provides financial assistance (up to \$2,000 per property) for conservation work on properties in Heritage Areas or items listed as a local or state heritage place.

Successful grant recipients David Meegan and Ilka Priebe have a delightful blue stone double-fronted cottage, built by notable local builder James Trevail in 1885-1890. Its original rear masonry wall ran through the rear of properties along the length of Clifton Street. A newly installed heritage plaque now identifies the significance of this place.

"We always wanted to keep the traditional, timeless appeal of the place, as well as improve its look and feel, whilst maintaining

the wonderful character," David said.

"We have replaced rotted verandah posts and completely repaired, resurfaced and properly painted the concrete verandah surface. It has really lifted the appearance of the place and will add to the longevity of the renovations by using good quality materials and treatments.

"We had heard about Council's funding program and approached the Council as we felt this was more than just an investment in our own property, but in retaining the heritage of the local area. The process with the council was stress-less and straight forward and we are very appreciative and grateful for the assistance and thrilled with the outcome."

The overall aim of the three heritage programs is to encourage the conservation, protection and enhancement of City of Prospect's valued heritage. This work is part of a two to five year strategy to provide heritage wayfinding in the local area where places and streets are identified and incorporated as part of future digital heritage walking trails



DO NATIVE BEES VISIT YOUR GARDEN?


Council's Environment and Sustainability Officer recently spotted a blue-banded bee on Prospect Road. Blue-banded bees are solitary bees that live in burrows in the soil or crevices of rocks. Unlike honey bees, blue-banded bees are buzz pollinators. They shake pollen out of flowers by 'head banging' the flower an astonishing 320 times per second!

They're excellent pollinators of tomato

crops in your veggie patch and are known to be attracted to blue and purple flowers, so gardens featuring native flax, fringe and chocolate lilies or old favourites like lavender and salvias will draw them in.

An estimated 300 species of native bees live around Adelaide and the Mount Lofty Ranges. Find out more about native bees and how you can attract them to your garden here:

Recycle your batteries and light globes

City of Prospect residents can now drop off small quantities of batteries and light globes for recycling at Payinithi.

Batteries and light globes contain valuable metals including aluminium, nickel, lithium, steel, zinc and mercury, all of which can be recovered and reused.

These common household items are not recyclable through your yellow kerbside recycling bin as they contain harmful substances which, if not managed properly, could damage the environment or catch on fire. They can, however, be recycled by dropping them off at collection points.

Household batteries can now be deposited in the battery recycling tube in the foyer of Payinithi. Acceptable batteries include:

- Domestic batteries (eg AA, AAA, C and D)
- Button batteries from calculators, watches and many toys
- 9-volt batteries
- Mobile phone batteries
- Small rechargeable batteries from cameras, cordless phones, shavers and some power tools.

Lead acid batteries are not acceptable. Visit the Hazardous Waste page on our website to find your nearest drop-off location.

Light globes can be left with our team at the Customer Service counter.

Sustainability at home

Making your home more sustainable doesn't have to mean a complete change or investing a lot of money.

Try one or two of these low-cost tips to get started:

- Put fruit and veggie scraps in your green bin.
- Fit a low-flow showerhead to reduce the water used while showering.
- Use cold water to wash your clothes, potentially saving 90 per cent of your machine's energy use that would otherwise be directed to heating the water.
- Plant a tree.
- Switch to LED light bulbs.
- Flick the switch off when you're not using electrical appliances. Gadgets left on standby, even smaller items like phone chargers, are energy suckers and can add 10 per cent to your electricity bill.

Prospect Library has Home Energy Toolkits available to borrow. The toolkits contain easy-to-use devices to help you find out how energy is used in your home and what you can do to make savings.
